TRANSFER FAIR AND ABOVE BOARD

Dwyer Defendants Win in an Interesting Action

The case of N. L. Marten, assignee for the benefit of the creditors of Eleanor F. Dwyer, against Eleanor Dwyer, her mother, Mrs. Margaret Dwyer, and her sister, Mrs. Margaret Carey, occupied the attention of the assize court yesterday afternoon. It is alleged that Eleanor F. Dwyer, while in an insolvent condition, transferred certain properties to the control of her mother, with intent to defraud her creditors.

The case of the land in question is as follows: It was bought by John W. Dwyer, a brother of Eleanor F. Dwyer, who deeded it to his parents, receiving a mortgage on the property in exchange. Later, another brother, Thos. Dwyer, paid off the mortgage, and made certain improvements on the property, on the understanding that it should eventually revert to him. Later Mrs. Dwyer deeded the property to her daughter Eleanor, without the knowledge of Thos. Dwyer.

The Plaintiff's Case.

Mr. F. P. Betts, counsel for the plaintiffs, attempted to get the various witnesses to acknowledge that there had been much talk in the household over the matter, and that, on receiving communications from the firm of Cronyn & Betts, threatening action for seizure against the land, Eleanor Dwyer had fraudulently deeded this property to her mother, to evade such seizure, and Mrs. Carey had subsequently taken out a mortgage on the same.

Mrs. Dwyer, Miss Eleanor Dwyer, and Mrs. Carey all denied any such conversation or understanding regarding the land.

In summing up, Mr. Betts said that it was perfectly plain that the property belonged to the mother, and was transferred to Eleanor Dwyer as her sole and only property through life.

The defendants have shown that the giving of the impeached land, and it was a suspicious circumstance that the deed had not been registered till the day the assignment was made.

Defendant Wins.

"There are certainly circumstances of suspicion," said his lordship, "but I think the charges have been rebutted. If the property belonged to Thos. Dwyer, subject to the life estate of his mother, there was then nothing fraudulent in transferring the property to insure its being safe from seizure."

The female defendants, subject to the rights of his sister, Eleanor, during life. Thos. did not get the deed owing to the death of his father, but his right to it was acknowledged by his mother. This being the case, I do not think that the transfer was made with intent to defraud, but was a bona fide transfer made in good faith.

Regarding the mortgage to Mrs. Carey, I find that this was given for value received, she having had no knowledge of her sister's insolvency at the time, and that therefore the mortgage was made in good faith.

"Considering these facts, I find that the plaintiff's case fails and I dismiss the action with costs."

ANNUAL INSPECTION OF SALVATION ARMY

Special Services Will Be Held at the Citadel Next Week.

In connection with the annual provincial inspection, which takes place at the provincial headquarters in London next week, and which is to be conducted by the chief secretary, Col. Mapp, and the field secretary, Lieut. Col. Gaskin, there will be a very special series of meetings conducted by these gentlemen, assisted by the divisional officers, who will be in for the occasion.

On Tuesday night, in the Citadel, on Clarence street, the chief secretary, Mr. Mapp, will give a lecture on India, its people, costumes and scenery. The colonel is well able to tackle this subject, as he was born in India, and spent many years in that country as one of the leading staff officers of the Indian army. He has held various important positions in other countries as well, and had lately been assistant field secretary in the old land. His lecture will be illustrated by limelight slides and moving pictures, and will be very interesting. He will be able to throw much light on the present unrest in that country.

On Wednesday night, at the South London Citadel, the field secretary will give a lecture on "Lessons From My Diary." Those who know Col. Gaskin are getting ready to not only hear but thoroughly enjoy his story-telling, which at times gets to the hilarious stage. Numbers remember his last service there, when the "Queen Fish" caught on. IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

Good Annual Report of Westminster Agricultural Society.

The annual meeting of the Westminster Agricultural Society was held in Union Hall, Lambeth, on Jan. 18, to receive the report of 1908 and to elect officers and directors for the ensuing year.

In presenting his financial statement the secretary-treasurer, H. Poole, had the pleasure to announce that everything had passed off very smoothly in the past year, thanks to the energies of the directorate and patrons of the society, who have been most generous in their donations to the fair.

The total receipts for the year were \$828 45, disbursements \$768 25, leaving a cash balance on hand of \$164 60.

BUILDERS' EXCHANGE

The Open Shop and Technical Schools Cause Discussion.

At the annual meeting of the Builders' Exchange, held Monday, the 18th, the president in his address, referred to some important questions that would necessarily come before the board of directors soon. The question of the open shop was a very important one with all employers of skilled labor.

Another very serious problem, and one that is attracting the attention of many deep thinkers, is the establishing of technical schools in all the large centres, as even now all the building trades are seriously handicapped by the lack of applicants fitted both in theory and practice to all positions that now it is almost impossible to fill with young men on account of the apprenticeship system being out of vogue.

The president thought that a large measure of the usefulness of the National Association of Builders would consist in their taking up all such matters and presenting them in their true light before the proper authorities.

Another matter touched on was the new building by-law, and he thought that it should be part of the builders' duties to see that the inspector strictly enforced it in every case.

In addition to the executive officers, Mr. John Whitaker, the vice-president of Ontario, and Mr. Wm. Tytler, on the national executive, will represent London at the Canadian National Association of Builders to be held in Ottawa on the 2nd of February next.
