

HAPPENINGS OF A DAY IN BUSY EAST LONDON.

REV. MR. ROLLINS ON LORD'S PRAYER

Interesting Series of Sermons Continued in King Street Church.

Rev. James Rollins continued his interesting series of sermons on the Lord's Prayer at the King Street Presbyterian Church Sunday, when he preached on the words "Hallowed be thy name."

Mr. Rollins showed the meaning of the word name in earlier times, and pointed out that in the Old Testament it stood for a man's reputation, and also denoted his authority and ownership, as well as his whole known character.

"The hallowing of God's name was not accomplished by a superstitious attitude, but by an attitude of deepest affection to God himself in all that we know him to be."

Mr. Rollins held that it was possible for us to have a wide knowledge of Christ, because his wisdom, his power, his thoughtfulness for his creatures, his love of order and duty have been revealed. His divine will has been shown by his rewarding goodness, by his righteousness, purity and judgment. Anything of injustice or oppression is unseen in the histories.

There had been a special revelation of him through the Hebrew people, which is described in the Old Testament. The Hebrews had knowledge of God and they knew him as Elohim, Jehovah, the Lord who provides, the Lord our healer, our victor, our peace and the Lord of righteousness and of hosts.

"Another source of information concerning God was the study of character, of great and good men, but in Jesus Christ we have the fullest and clearest revelation of God. He made a distinct contribution to our knowledge in many ways."

"We hallow his name, therefore, by spreading abroad our knowledge of him, by making known his fatherhood and love, by keeping his commandments, by devout and earnest worship and by leading a consistent Christian life," he concluded.

STRIKING SERMON ON BOOK OF REVELATIONS

Rev. E. W. Hughes, of Tillsonburg, in All Saints' Church.

Rev. E. W. Hughes, of Tillsonburg, who is conducting the services at All Saints' Church, during the absence of the pastor, Rev. T. B. Clark, who is in England, delivered a striking sermon on the Book of Revelations last evening.

Mr. Hughes has studied the "Revelations" for many years, and he is now considered an authority on it. He stated that he has made a special study of that portion of the Bible as it is the only book the study of which is rewarded by God.

It is expected that Mr. Clark will return to this city about the last of November, as a letter to that effect has been received. He is meeting with much success, and has already collected a large sum which will be applied to the church debt.

REV. FATHER TOBIN IN ST. MARY'S CHURCH.

Interesting Sermon Reached on Sunday Morning.

Rev. Father Tobin delivered a short sermon at St. Mary's Church yesterday morning, taking his text from the gospel of the day.

In an interesting manner, he told the story of the healing of a man in Nazareth who was suffering from palsy.

His friends had great difficulty in bringing him before God, as there was a great crowd in the building. They finally succeeded by cutting a hole in the roof and lowering him down.

Christ identifies himself with the victims of disease, when he said, "I desire to have mercy on the sick."

There is therefore a great incentive to charity that the final reward may be received.

REV. E. R. BLACK LEAVES FOR WEST.

Former Pastor of Dundas Street Christian Church.

Rev. E. R. Black, the retiring pastor of the Dundas Street Christian Church, left this morning at 11:35 to take up his new work at the University of Toronto.

At the conclusion of the evening service the congregation was requested to remain seated by the deacons, after which a number of men made addresses concerning the pastorate of Mr. Black.

He was a favorite with all, and it was with sincere regret that his resignation was accepted. All wished him the heartiest success in his new work. The church services will be in charge of Mrs. Black for one month, and should Mr. Black find his work satisfactory, a new pastor will be secured at the end of that time.

"THE IMPORTANCE OF OUR THOUGHTS."

Sermon By Rev. Mr. Hazen in the Centennial Church.

"The Importance of Our Thoughts" was the subject of a sermon by Rev. G. N. Hazen at the Centennial Methodist Church last evening. The text was from Proverbs xlii, 7: "For as he thinketh in his heart so is he," and Proverbs iv, 23: "Keep thy heart with all diligence, for out of it are the issues of life."

The preacher dealt first with the importance of our thoughts, as they are the parents of the deeds, and if our actions are rational they are planned in the mind. This was undoubtedly

true when God created the world. He must have first thought of it. It is also true with regard to science, art and all other things.

It is important that children should study in order that they fill the minds with proper material, and develop it, for out of the mind comes the thoughts. It is also necessary that they indulge in literature of the proper stamp, for thoughts are important to actions.

If boys are allowed to read books of evil desire they will grow up with those desires. On the other hand good books will make a good impression on them. Alexander the Great was filled with the ideas contained in Homer's Iliad, and he had also his father's example. Consequently he achieved mighty things when he grew to manhood.

The speaker then said that as a man becomes so he thinks. That is, a man makes his own world and thinks of things according to what he is. He can control his thoughts, for as is shown in everyday life. To enter life on any particular line a man must control and direct his thoughts along that line to make a success of it. Therefore, as he can control his thoughts he is responsible for his actions.

Evil can be avoided by keeping thoughts concentrated on good things and by keeping the heart true. The mind and time should be occupied properly, and lofty literature alone should be indulged in.

EXAMPLE OF ANCIENT TIMES SHOULD BE FOLLOWED.

Sermon By Rev. A. J. Bowen in Egerston Street Baptist Church.

An interesting sermon was preached by Rev. A. J. Bowen, the pastor of the Egerston Street Baptist Church, at the evening services yesterday, the theme being "Jesus in Galilee."

Christ spent about eighteen months of his three years of labor in Galilee, he having left Judea. This shows that if God is not revered He will leave us to go to a country where He is more appreciated. He is willing to help all independent of the country.

At all times he made perfect cures of the unfortunate who were brought to him, and in no case did he refuse to assist any person. The preacher referred to the cures made by "quack" doctors, and the patient generally returns to his former condition a few days after the alleged cure. Such was not the case with Jesus Christ.

The example set by the people of ancient times, who brought others to be cured, should be followed now, as there are many who are in need of assistance. In concluding the sermon made a strong plea to all to come to Christ.

Baptismal services were held after the regular services, and many new members were received into the church.

HARVEST THANKSGIVING SERVICES AT ST. MATTHEW'S

Were Held on Sunday—Collections Amounted to \$132.

Harvest thanksgiving services were held at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church Sunday, and a collection amounting to \$132 was taken up for running expenses of the church.

Rev. Wm. Lowe, the pastor, preached in the evening, taking his text from Psalm cxxi, 1.

He pointed out that the psalm speaks of creation and national blessing, and that it was very appropriate to the harvest services.

"We should always be grateful," he said, "for thanksgiving is thanksgiving."

He also commended his congregation for their generosity during his term as rector of the church.

The edifice was beautifully decorated with grain, fruit, flowers and produce, all of which will be donated to the Thomas Alway Home in South London.

The choir provided an excellent programme of special music.

A number of games were partaken of and the gathering broke up at an early hour, all voting a very enjoyable evening.

Sudan Interior Mission.
The Sudan Interior Mission has been for a number of years past sending the gospel of Christ to the benighted natives of Western Africa under the British flag. The province contains a population of over 50,000,000. These people are being rapidly overrun by the Mohammedans, whose religion is tolerated under British Government, and now is the opportunity for the inhabitants of that dark continent to become Christians. Two missionaries are going out to that field at a very early date under the auspices of the Sudan Interior Mission, and a farewell service will be held in the First Presbyterian Church in this city on Tuesday evening, Oct. 26. The names of the missionaries are Mr. Lang and Mr. Ria. Both of them, we understand, have spoken to audiences here before.

Archbishop in London.
Archbishop McEvoy, of Toronto, arrived in the city on Friday evening on his way to Walkerville, where yesterday he dedicated the handsome Lady of the Lake Church. He was assisted in the dedication services by Right Rev. J. R. Archambault, bishop of Joliette, Que., and Rev. Father Van Antwerp, of Holy Rosary Church, Detroit. The ceremony of dedication was continued this morning, when the new edifice was blessed by the Archbishop. This evening a class of 105 persons will be confirmed. The new church is one of the handsomest buildings in Western Ontario and will seat 1,200 people. The main altar is of marble and is the gift of the C. M. B. A. to the church. The appointments of the new church are of the most beautiful description. While in the city Archbishop McEvoy stated that there was nothing to say yet in regard to who will succeed him as bishop of London.

WHITE PLAGUE FIGHTERS

Professor Pannivitz and Dr. Freund Visitors at Montreal.

Montreal, Oct. 12.—Two celebrated German scientists, Prof. Pannivitz and Dr. Freund, who came from Germany to attend the International Tuberculosis Congress at Washington, arrived in the city today, and are this afternoon addressing the committee of the Brehmer Rest, an institution for the treatment of tuberculosis in the Laurentian Mountains, on the latest methods of the treatment of the disease.

The leader of the German movement in the tuberculosis fight, and has been rewarded by the Kaiser. Dr. Freund also has taken a conspicuous part in the war being waged in Germany on the white plague. Their visit is attracting much attention in medical circles, the visitors were entertained at lunch at the Mount Royal Club, after which the meeting took place at the Art Gallery, presided over by Dr. Roddick.

Reported That James Curwood Met Death in West.

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—It is reported from The Pas that James Oliver Curwood, the well-known American author of Detroit, Mich., who recently went into Hudson Bay with his publisher, Bobb Merrill Publishing Company, has been killed by Indians in Lac La Ronge country.

The trader, through whom the report comes, says that Lac La Ronge Indians assert that the white man began trouble by shooting one of their people. Reports of the Northwest Mounted Police, who are investigating, are expected in a few days.

Curwood is a writer of wide reputation, and has written a number of his books are now under publication.

ERB MURDER A PLOT

Police Fit Damaging Evidence Together to Prove Theory.

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 11.—Working on the theory that Captain Erb was murdered as the result of a cold and deliberate plot, his wife and her sister, Mrs. Katherine Beisel, Philadelphia detectives have pieced together a remarkable chain of evidence.

The detectives believe Erb was beaten almost to death with a pocket electric flashlight and a heavy cuspidor by his wife before Mrs. Beisel left the house.

They have discovered that Erb practised with a revolver. This she carried in her riding boot while on her many horseback tours of the surrounding country, firing at objects along the roadside. Once, at least, in the past, he was fired at by a bullet at Detective Austin Gavan, who is at work on the present case.

When Gavan recently called at Red Gables to see Captain Erb, as the front door was opened a woman's form appeared at the head of the stairway, and he asserted, a bullet whizzed by him. He ducked, and he said today, Mrs. Erb apologized, saying: "Pardon, please. I really thought you were somebody else."

NOT ENGAGED

Elkins Denies Daughter Is to Wed the Duke of Abruzzi.

Pittsburg, Oct. 12.—Senator Elkins talked to the Associated Press over the long distance telephone from Elkins, W. Va., and denied reports over the numerous wild reports published from time to time, concerning the alleged engagement of his daughter to the Italian nobleman.

There is no foundation for the many reports, he said, neither in Europe or America has any announcement of an engagement been made. There is no engagement.

GALA DAY AT YOKOHAMA.

Yokohama, Oct. 12.—Yokohama is a blaze of color this morning with American and Japanese flags flying from every building in honor of the delegation of Pacific coast businessmen, who arrived at 7 o'clock on the Japanese liner Tennyson Maru from San Francisco. The visitors were greeted at the dock by a crowd which numbered hundreds of representative businessmen of Japan, assembled from all cities of the empire.

The entertainment for the Americans commenced as soon as they stepped ashore, and every day of their stay in Japan will be completely filled with receptions and sightseeing trips arranged by their Japanese hosts.

Thursday the Americans will be the guests of Count Juroon at luncheon, given in honor of the visitors.

Mann, a wealthy resident of Oak Park, as the purchaser of the rope which bound Mrs. Frances Thompson in her death struggles, the discovery of a key in his pocket which is said to fit the door to the death chamber in the house at 1242 Michigan avenue, and the recovery of a watch from Mann's pocket alleged to belong to the murdered woman, form yesterday's important developments in the Thompson murder mystery.
