New York, June 10.—George Mullin, the undefeated Tiger twirler, annexed another victory to his already long string today, when he humbled Stallings' Highlanders in the final game of the series by a score of 2 to 1. Today's game makes it eleven successive victories and no defeats, for Mullin, a record unequalled by no other pitcher in either of the major leagues this season.

Drove in Winning Run.
When Mullin is credited with the latest victory over the cheery Yankee youngsters, it does not mean only that George, by his pitching prevented the home team from chalking up scores in the run column. He allowed the Highlanders but seven hits, which were widely removed from each other. In other words, Mullin permitted no more than one single in any single round. But the big fellow did more than this. With the score a tie at 1 to 1, he actually drove in the tally with a corking double, which decided the contest which gave the Tigers the big end of the present series and permitted the pitcher himself to retain the title of the unbeaten American League flinger.

Pretty Contest.
The game, as the score indicates, was the most closely contested of the three played here. The Highlanders, occupying the position in the percentage column next to the league leaders, have been playing a snappy game of late. The Yankee admirers had hoped to see a big reduction made in the Tiger average during their stay in this city. Today's game was a pretty one. Both teams played errorless ball, and more than one sensational piece of fielding was furnished the rather small crowd of fans who gathered to see the contest, a threatening rainstorm dampening the ardor of the other less enthusiastic bugs.

McConnell Took Flight.
McConnell, the Yankee giant, began the last struggle of the quartet scheduled here for his team-mates. The tall one occupied a place on the mound for one brief inning. It was into one tally, and then McConnell was seemed to be afraid of the Champions and was stricken with nervousness. The result was a wild pitch, a balk, two passes for the Tigers in the very first inning. Two singles aided the Champions in turning the combination a very eventful round for him. He requested to watch the game from the bench.

Spoils Manning's Record.
Manning, who trounced the Tigers so decisively in the first game of the series, then went in the box. Barring his first round, in which he pitched the youngster pitched splendid ball. Although a trifle wild he kept his hits well scattered, and after the second inning the Detroit club failed to round up another score off him.

But another one wasn't needed. The one tally proved quite enough to land the victory for the Tigers, and to spoil the hitherto unsullied record of Manning, the Yankee prospect, who has been pitching sensational ball for the Highlanders to date.

MANY CANADIAN ENTRIES
FOR BIG DETROIT MEET

Ethel Mac, Well Known Mare, Entered in M. and M. \$10,000 Stake—Other Fast Ones.

Detroit, June 11.—Canada is playing a more important part than usual in the harness racing sport this year. It has a high class meeting at Fort Erie in August and a big week at Windsor July 29 to 31. The Windsor meeting is the curtain-raiser for the grand circuit. Horses trained in the east will make their first appearance at the Border City, and will meet the pick of the Michigan and Canadian circuits, also many from the south.

The M. and M. Stake.
From Windsor the trotters and pacers cross to Detroit for the opening of the grand circuit, the annual blue ribbon meeting taking place July 26 to 30. The famous Merchants' and Manufacturers' \$10,000 stake and the great Chamber of Commerce stake of \$5,000, will be renewed with large and exceptional fields. In the first-named the Canadian mare, Ethel Mac, of that round on the half-mile tracks of Ontario last year, is highly regarded.

The Chamber of Commerce.
Axtara, owned at Tillsonburg, is one of the best in the Chamber of Commerce. The free-for-all pacing stake has among its entries the well-known Canadian flyers, Darkey Hal and Major Brino. There will be a liberal sprinkling of speed from various provinces in the other events, contributing their share toward making the contests notable.

While spring training has been somewhat backward owing to the great amount of rain, horses all over the country are well advanced that they have been showing surprising speed, so record-breaking doubtless will again be the order on the fast Detroit oval.
