EVERY MAN NEEDED NOW; FOR FIGHT IS CANADA'S AS WELL AS BRITAIN'S

Chaplain of 33rd Declares That Young Canadians Are Not Rallying To Colors As They Should — Women Knitting Socks Too Thick.

"I regret exceedingly that our young Canadians are not enlisting as they should! Any number of splendid young men are in this district who should join the colors. They do not seem to have realized the seriousness of the situation, and that the Empire is fighting for its existence. They do not seem to hear that insistent call that rings in the soul of every English, Irish and Scotsman whenever the motherland is in peril and makes them leave everything, no matter where they are, and go to the firing line. This is Canada's fight just as much as Britain's, and we need every man for the work ahead. Far greater casualties than we have yet had are bound to come, and these may perhaps help awaken our young men to the heavy work to be done before the German menace is removed."

Capt. H. D. Peacock, recruiting officer of the 33rd Battalion and grand chaplain of the Oranemen of this district, spoke as above to a large gathering of the brethren last evening assembled for the dedication of Langemark Lodge's new hall.

Pity Those Who Are Left.
"People need not pity us who have suffered our services," he continued. "Those who deserve the nation's sympathy and help are our mothers and wives and sisters. If we meet death we meet it gloriously and for a just cause, but those who stay behind can only work, and hope and pray. I would ask you all every day at 12 o'clock, when the hands on the dial point heavenward, no matter whether you are

at home or at work, to stop everything and make a silent prayer for just a few seconds for our cause."

Capt. Peacock praised the splendid work the women of the district are doing for the soldiers. Every week, he said, he receives large quantities of useful gifts and tokens for the men. He made a special plea for tobacco, declaring the men enjoy it above everything.

Socks Too Thick.
"There is one thing the soldiers would like the women to do," he said, "and that is for those who are knitting socks not to knit them so thick. Some of them are so thick we can't get our legs on over them, they must be nearly half an inch through."

Grand Master E. T. Essery of the grand lodge made a stirring patriotic address. Sixteen thousand Oranemen, he said, have already gone to the front, and there are a quarter of a million more who will go if need be.

Touching on the political situation, he declared that Oranemen stood for want was right.

Threw Robin Out.
"The people of Canada," he said, "can give Oranemen the credit for wrecking the Robin Government. It was our order that made those politicians wail the plank. We can and will put out any government that is not doing what is right."

BRANTFORD BUILDING INCREASES.
BRANTFORD, July 2.—The total number of building contracts issued in the city last month amounts to 126. The total value is stated to be \$154,000, which is an increase of \$49,520 over the corresponding month of last year.

RUSSIAN ACCOUNTS OF FRIDAY'S NAVAL ENGAGEMENT.
The Russian accounts of Friday's naval engagement off the Gothland coast record the beaching of one German warship and the flight of several cruisers with accompanying torpedo boats, which the Russian fleet encountered and engaged during a foggy morning on the Baltic.

Unofficial dispatches say the beached vessel was the mine-layer Albatross, and that the Russians finally retired because of the numerical superiority of the German fleet.

Other naval activities include the sinking of three Turkish merchantmen by a Russian submarine in the Black Sea and the torpedoing of the Belgian steamer Boduognat by a German undersea boat.

The latest Russian official statement admits a continuation of the retreat before the armies of Field Marshal von Mackensen in Southern Poland, whose forces are drawing daily nearer to Lublin. Heavy fighting apparently is continuing.

The Russians also concede the German claim to new successes in Galicia, admitting that important forces of Teutons have forced their way across the Gnila Lipa.

Italian headquarters reports an increase of activity along the entire front, and records advances in Carina and near Fretkofel. Unofficial dispatches reported the occupation by the Italians of Tolmino, in the Isonzo Valley, but added that the Austrians still held the fortification near the place, and that the battle was continuing.

Recent accounts of successes for the Entente Allies in the Gallipoli Peninsula are countered by a Turkish statement, declaring that the British forces there were driven back to their old positions.

Authorization of a new \$500,000 loan by Russia is announced from Petrograd.

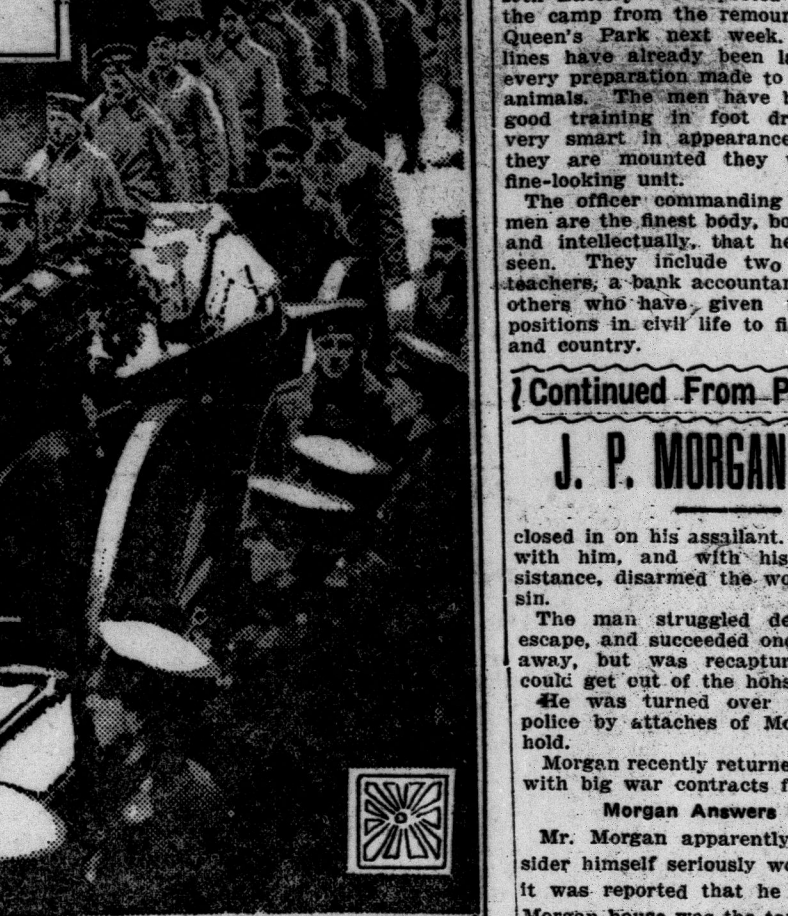

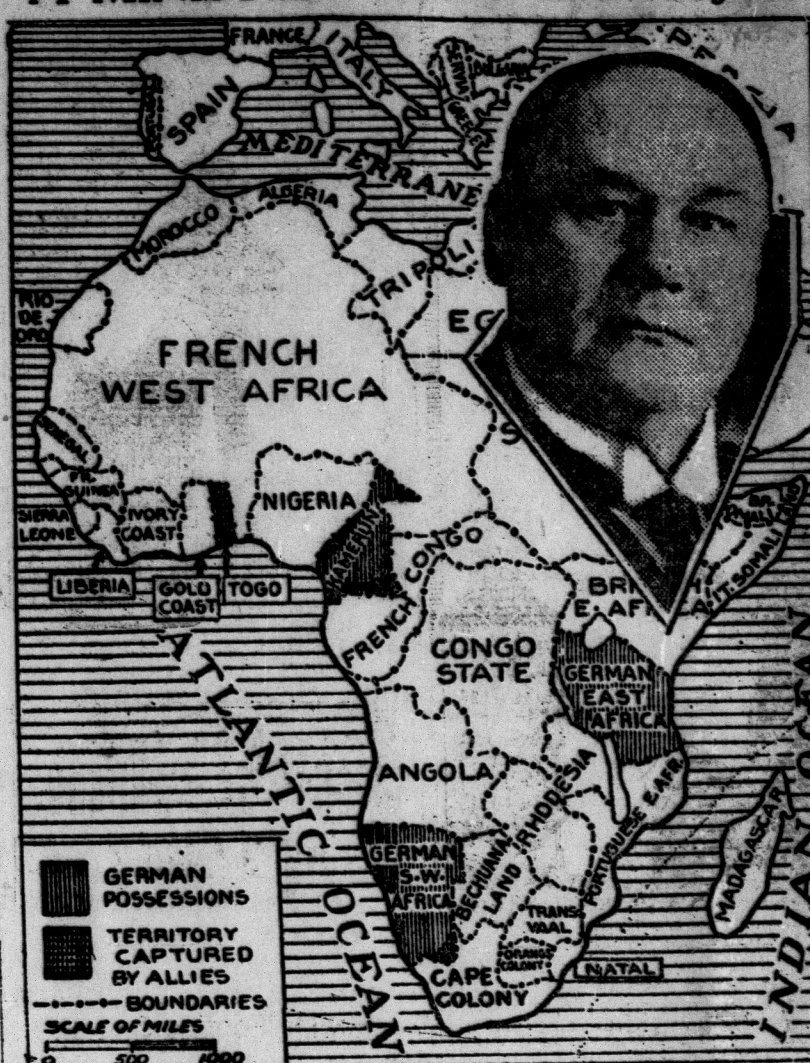

saying that he was an old friend. Word was taken to Mr. Morgan that some one wanted to see him. Mr. Morgan, who was in the main hall, immediately on his appearance the intruder shot at him. He had two revolvers, and used them both.

There is still some discrepancy in the statements as to just where the bullet struck Mr. Morgan. Report has it that the first wounded him in the leg and the second near the pit of the stomach. The wound inflicted here is the more serious of the two. It is related that several shots were fired by the assailant, but that they went wild.

Not Serious.
Dr. W. H. Zabriskie, of Glen Cove, was immediately summoned, and Dr. Markoe, of this city was sent for. Mr. Morgan's wounds were examined, and word was given out that it was not believed that they were necessarily serious.

No identification of Mr. Morgan's assailant has as yet been made. Mr. Morgan, who was with his wife and daughters, went to their summer home in Glen Cove after the marriage of his son Julius Spencer Morgan, in Boston about two weeks ago.

Matinick Point, where the Morgan home is located, is almost surrounded by water and is about two to three miles from the central part of the village of Glen Cove.

OF GERMAN DESCENT.
Glen Cove, July 2.—Mr. Morgan's assailant is declared by official sources to have been of German descent, to have said he was of German descent and that he was willing to give up his life at any time to end the war. It was added that he declared Mr. Morgan was responsible for the war, and that he could stop the conflict if he wished.

Justice of the Peace Lyster questioned the prisoner.
"I am a German gentleman," was the only reply the man would make when pressed for his name. He declined also to say where he came from, as to his reasons for shooting Mr. Morgan.
