MEMBERS OF DAIL EIREANN TO BE FREED

Imprisoned Feiners To Attend Sessions When Peace Is Discussed.

CABINET MEETING HELD

London Confident That Peace Is Only Question of Time.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—None of the imprisoned members of the Dail Eireann have as yet been liberated, but it is considered certain the Government will replace nothing in the way of their release, and that they will be free to attend the sittings of the Dail Eireann when that body convenes to discuss the peace proposals.

Meetings of the Ulster cabinet and the Dail Eireann "cabinet" were held today. So far as is known, however, they were not directly connected with the hitherto unsuccessful efforts to bring about an agreement between the north and south, preliminary to a tripartite conference at London.

Only incidentally, the "Republican cabinet" confined itself to consideration of the Dail Eireann meeting, while Lieut.-Col. Spender, secretary to the Irish cabinet, announced at the conclusion of its deliberations that the question of peace had been touched upon only incidentally.

Notwithstanding the lack of definite action immediately connected with the peace, or of even a hint of the imminence of such action, confidence continues to prevail in political circles in London that there is no likelihood of a breakdown in the negotiations.

DAIL EIREANN MEETS.

DUBLIN, Aug. 5.—A meeting of the Dail Eireann cabinet was held today at the Mansion House with Eamonn de Valera presiding. The forthcoming meeting of the Dail Eireann was discussed, and the question will be entitled to attend was an interesting point raised.

After the last elections for Northern and Southern Ireland the Sinn Fein party, anxious for the establishment of a national assembly, embracing all parties in Ireland, resolved to constitute the Dail Eireann from every man elected, including members of the Orange party and of Trinity College.

Got Small Response.

The Sinn Fein therefore issued invitations to all those elected, asking whether they desired to join, and how they have decided to send invitations only to those persons who then indicated their willingness to join in the national body. Thus, the Dail Eireann will consist of 132 persons who accepted the invitation.

MOORS BUTCHER SOLDIERS AFTER THEY SURRENDER

Had Promised To Spare Lives of Spanish Troops.

MADRID, Aug. 5.—Twenty Spanish soldiers, the last remnant of the Spanish troops to resist capture of the town of Nador, fifteen miles south of Melilla, were massacred by the Moors after having surrendered, according to advices received here today from Melilla.

The massacred Spanish troops had held out for eleven days against great odds, the dispatch said, taking refuge in a church and finally in a nearby mill. They surrendered, it was said, only after the attacking tribesmen had offered to spare their lives.

The Moors, entering the town, ransacked houses and demolished the church. Some of the Spanish troops who succeeded in escaping are said to have seen the Moors disputing over the booty they had captured. During the dispute it was said a number of their own men were killed and wounded.

During the eleven days that the Spanish contingent resisted the invaders they were forced to survive on barley and wheat, procured in a random, dangerous position.

Since the recent drive by the Moors in the region south of Melilla, Spanish forces of the Third Foreign Corps and men from the command of General Navarro have been reported in a precarious position at Mount Arrat. As late as August 4 it was stated the troops here and also at Nador and Zeilan were continuing to resist the Moors, and that the aeroplanes were supplying them with food, medicine and ammunition. Thursday, however, a report came that Mount Arrat had been evacuated.

The Moors operating against the Spaniards in this region according to reports received in Madrid, had their army organized in European style.

BRITAIN TO TRY SEX EQUALITY IN CIVIL SERVICE

Women Likely To Be Admitted On Same Basis As Men.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—An important step in the direction of equality of sexes was taken in the House of Commons today as a result of the discussion regarding the admission of women to positions in the civil service. The resolution introduced by Sir Robert Stevenson Horne, chancellor of the exchequer, was unanimously adopted, providing that after a transitional period of three years women shall be admitted to civil service in the United Kingdom under the same conditions and regulations as govern men.

Regard, however, is to be had to the suitability of the women to the situation. Women appointed to posts in the civil service will have the same status and authority as men, but having regard to the financial position of the country the question of remuneration of women as compared with men shall be reviewed within three years.

A proviso was inserted in the resolution safeguarding the interests of former service men.

QUEBEC WILL GIVE BYNG FINE WELCOME

Residents of Ancient Capital Making Great Preparations For Visit.

QUEBEC, Aug. 5.—That the people of Quebec City feel deeply honored and pleased by the fact that the new governor-general of Canada, Lord Byng, has chosen the oldest city in America as his first landing place on Thursday, August 11, is shown by the preparations that are being made towards extending a hearty welcome.

An immense arch has been erected at the King's Wharf, where the viceregal party will land, and the streets will be decorated with flags and bunting. It is planned that the reception will be quite as elaborate as that which greeted H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, when he came here to take office as governor-general.

According to the official program for the reception, Lord Byng will land at King's Wharf at 11:15 Thursday morning, and at 11:30 will leave for the Parliament Buildings, where the administration of the oath of office takes place at 12 o'clock. During the afternoon the viceregal party will visit places of interest in the city, and at 5 o'clock will go to Spencerwood, the residence of the lieutenant-governor for dinner. At 10:30 the party will leave Spencerwood for the C. P. R. station, where it will entrain for Ottawa.

U. F. O. TO CALL CONVENTION

D. M. Ross and J. D. Wilson May Be Choice in North Oxford.

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 5.—Promises of early activity among the political parties of North Oxford in connection with the coming by-election for the Legislature, necessitated by the death of John Calder is given today in the information that the U. F. O. executive will meet next week to make arrangements for the holding of a convention. They have definitely decided to enter a candidate, and D. M. Ross and J. D. Wilson are in-line for the nomination. Dr. Sinclair, who has been mentioned as a possible Liberal candidate, stated today that he would not go after the position, but would consider the matter if asked to stand.

SEVEN DEAD FROM EATING POISON FUNGI

Baby Only One of Entire Family To Escape Horrible Death.

Thought Them Mushrooms

Fatal Feast Was Gathered by the Children.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 5.—(By Canadian Press.)—Seven persons are dead at Stuartburn, near Dominion City, Man., as a result of eating poisonous fungi, in the belief that they were mushrooms, according to word received here this afternoon.

The deaths wipe out an entire family, consisting of Fred Huska, his wife and five children, the only survivor being a six-months-old baby. The tragedy was practically complete before neighbors knew that sickening touches the family, and when help arrived it was too late to save the father, who was the last to succumb.

The story as it could be gathered from the almost incoherent utterances of the sick man, was that the mushrooms, or what they took to be mushrooms, were gathered by the children on Sunday, cooked and eaten. The first death occurred on Monday. Another child died Tuesday, and by this time all the members of the family were suffering from the poison and unable to help themselves.

The family lived four miles from Stuartburn, and had been gathering mushrooms for some time. An inquest held yesterday, at which a verdict was returned that all the deaths were from poisoning and attaching blame to no one.

GRAIN COMMISSION WILL INVESTIGATE WEIGHT AND GRADES

Integrity of Officers At Elevators To Be Probed Also.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 5.—The board of grain commissioners will investigate all matters within its jurisdiction which might affect the weight and grades of grain, and the integrity of its officers at all elevators, according to a letter made public today by R. J. Henderson from R. Hetherington, secretary of the board. The letter was in reply to one sent by Mr. Henderson to the board asking for a go-ahead on the investigation which he made before the royal grain inquiry commission at Fort William some time ago.

Mr. Hetherington says he is also directed to state that the board has "no intention or desire, nor would it have any right to eliminate any member of the board at such investigation."

ESSEX FARMERS ARE COMING TO LONDON

Auto Tour of Ontario Planned To Start August 16.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

WINNIPEG, Aug. 5.—Members of the farmers' section of the chamber of commerce will make an auto tour through the agricultural sections of the province, winding up at the Chipewyan, Port Carleton and the Falls, where an inspection will be made of the work going on there. It is expected that at least 100 farmers will take part in the trip which will take about four days. Auto owners may make up their own parties.

The trip will be under the direction of J. W. Noble of Essex, representative of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Among the places where stops will be made, are Highgate, Ridgeway, Avonlea, Simcoe, London, Welland, Jordan, St. Catharines and Niagara. The tour will start from Leamington on the morning of August 16.

HARVESTING WILL BE GENERAL NEXT WEEK

Recent Rains Have Greatly Helped Crops in the West.

TORONTO, Aug. 5.—The harvesting of wheat in the prairie provinces will be general about the 10th of August, according to a comprehensive report on the condition of the growing grain there from agents along Canadian National lines, received at the head office of that system here today.

"It is apparent," says the report, "that the rains which fell over wide areas in the West during the early portion of last week have had a generally beneficial effect. In many instances these rains have the effect of clearing away the old crop, and cutting has been postponed on that account."

"The reports are optimistic in their estimates of yield vary up to 40 bushels to the acre. There are large numbers expecting a bumper crop."

WALL STREET EXPLOSION SUSPECT RELEASED

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The complaint against Giuseppe Filis, a truckman of Bayonne, N. J., arrested several months ago by agents of the department of justice in connection with the Wall Street explosion, was dismissed today by United States Commissioner Hitchcock. De Filis had been "identified" by several persons as a man seen standing beside the cart, thought to have carried explosives into the financial district, but it was announced today that he was loading freight cars in Bayonne when the blast occurred. YOUNG FARMER HAS SHOULDER DISLOCATED Charles Hendy, an employee on the farm of Artemus O'Neil, near Denfield, was admitted to Victoria Hospital last night suffering from a dislocated shoulder. Hendy and O'Neil had been harvesting all day and were bringing in the last load of wheat when the horses became frightened and ran away. Both men were thrown from the load, but Mr. O'Neil was not badly injured.

POLICE CLOSED MANY SHOWS

Lid Is Clamped On by Council At Brantford.

BRANTFORD, Aug. 5.—Following a special meeting of the city council, when the order was passed that all amusements, except mechanical devices, with the shows on the Market Square, and all booths and concessions except the refreshment booths, had to be cleared off city property, the police closed every show not exempt. The council took the stand that permission was given only to the shows specifically exempted. This second closing for many of the gambling devices or games of chance being shut up on Wednesday to re-open with new devices "as games of skill" immediately afterwards.

The massed band concert fireworks display and drills by C. H. Hartman's "old boys" drill corps, famous a number of years ago as never defeated in competition, put on some of their old games, and the council's decision was a financial success, and the number of visitors, considering the business depression and the high railway fares, was considered good.

TRIED TO BURN HER IN HOUSE, WIFE ALLEGES

Windsor Man Is Under Arrest On Charge of Arson.

WINDSOR, Aug. 5.—David Long, 1553 Church street, set fire to his home today, destroying it, in an attempt to end his wife's life, according to the allegation made by Mrs. Long in a formal complaint submitted to Chief of Police Thompson today. Long was arrested on complaint of his wife, and is held on a charge of arson.

Neighbors saw flames coming from the house shortly before noon and called the fire department. When the entire building was ablaze Mrs. Long rushed to the house, barely escaping with her life.

Long was standing near when the firemen and police arrived. He was taken to police headquarters when Mrs. Long accused him, as she reached safety.

Fire Chief DeWitts asserted that the rapidly with which the flames spread indicated that kerosene or something equally inflammable had been scattered over the building. Mrs. Long followed her husband to police headquarters, and there in a statement alleged that her husband had beaten her frequently, and a few months ago he had attempted to burn the house, the last time occurring before the fire they had quarreled.

CROP CONDITIONS MOST FAVORABLE THROUGHOUT WEST

Reports From Prairie Provinces Are Especially Optimistic.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 5.—Crop conditions along the Canadian National Railway lines in the Prairie Provinces are most favorable, according to A. E. Warren, general manager, who is making an inspection trip over the western lines. North of the main lines from Winnipeg, Saskatoon and Edmonton grain are fairly good. There has been plenty of rain, and the season throughout has been particularly favorable, perhaps.

The big central portion of Alberta has a good crop, and so Mr. Warren arrived in time to help the wheat, as well as other grain crops, except early sown and early-maturing varieties. Optimistic reports come also from most districts in Saskatchewan and Manitoba which are reached by the Canadian National Railway system.

Cutting has commenced in several districts, and while it will not be general for a week or so, indications are that harvesting will be earlier than usual.

LOUIS J. OUELLETTE DIES IN DETROIT

DETROIT, Aug. 4.—Death occurred in the Providence Hospital here tonight, of Louis J. Ouellette, a native of Windsor, and for years well known down town as a cafe proprietor. He was 62 years old, and a member of the oldest and best-known families in Essex County. Ouellette was a principal thoroughgoing business man, and his death was a loss to the community. His wife was the widow of a Western Ontario man when they wed the city. Augustus Ouellette of Leamington is a brother.

LIVESTOCK MEN TAKE ACTION TO BOOST EXPORTS

Doing Everything Possible To Stabilize Business in Alberta.

EDMONTON, Aug. 5.—Edmonton livestock men are not lagging behind in the matter of doing everything that is humanly possible to boost the livestock industry in Alberta and relieve the present situation, which has given indications of becoming panicky, owing to the low prices prevailing on the home market.

A committee from the Edmonton livestock exchange held a meeting yesterday and took action, which it is expected will be most far-reaching in promoting the export industry and relieving a situation which recently has been putting most harmful exporters. The committee sent a telegram to Dr. J. G. Torrance, veterinary director-general of the department of agriculture at Ottawa, urging most insistently that the veterinary in charge at the stockyards be given full power to inspect all cattle coming into the yards and to issue all certificates.

WILL TAKE ACTION.

CALGARY, Aug. 5.—Immediate action will be taken by the special committee appointed by Bruce Robinson, President of the Board of Trade, to investigate measures that will provide a remedy for conditions which threaten to threaten Canada's livestock industry.

Members of this committee, which includes W. Peterson, W. F. Richardson and J. H. Woods, with Cecil Rice as secretary, met this morning and agreed that a systematic effort should be made to interest and inform

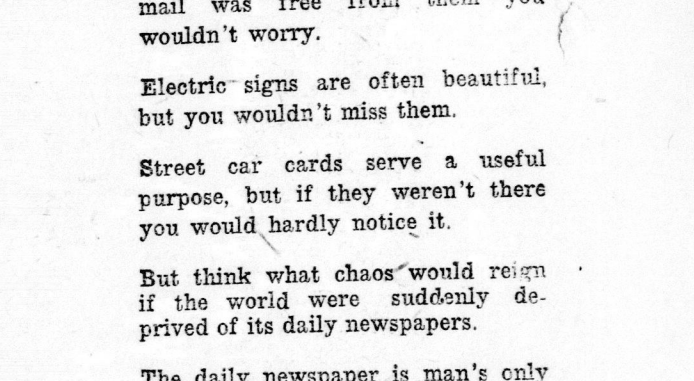
