After being out one hour and 45 minutes, the jury brought in a ver-dict of guilty with a doubly strong recommendation for mercy. Clare was charged with manslaughter as a result of an accident on Waterloo street on the evening of June 4 last, when in turning his motor car from Unionists Picture Bewhiskered Waterloo to Hill street, he struck a motorcycle driven by Charles Lane. The latter died in Victoria hospital on June 10 from injuries received.
