VERDICT RETURNED

Evidence Heard Regarding Death of J. Taylor of Muirkirk.

St. Thomas, Feb. 9 .- the jury impaneled to inquire into the death of James Taylor, Muirkirk farmer, who died from injuries received at the Muirkirk station on the evening of February 9, when struck by the M. C. R. local passenger No. 12, attached no blame to the train crew. The wording of the verdict was: "From the evidence we find that Mr. Taylor's death was purely accidental and lor's death was purely accidental and we attach no blame to any person."
