They were: "Because the church exalts human values in life; because the church makes humanity conscious of the presence of God; because the the presence of God; because the church makes for generally better living conditions; because the church living conditions: because the church enthrones Jesus in all human activities and because Jesus Christ is the solution of every human problem."

"People criticizing the church for lack of life and activity and accusing her of failure are usually those who

never go to a church," he declared.
