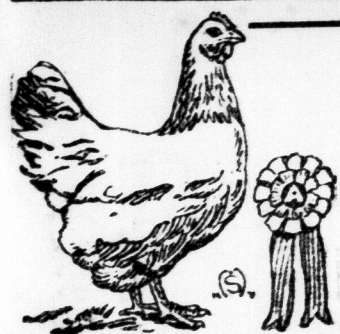
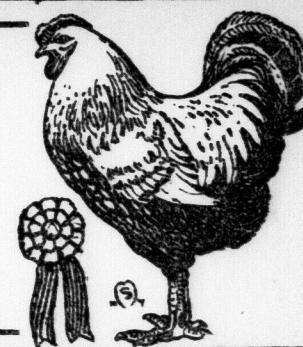

This Year's Show Going To Be One of the Best Yet In Fanciers' Interests

Secretary Andrews Says Exhibition Will Be Proud To Class Among Other Progressive Shows.

The 27th annual exhibition of the London Poultry and Pet Stock Association opens at the fair grounds, Queen's park, today, and continues until Thursday, Oct. 29. When the entries closed on Wednesday, secretary J. C. Andrews was more than satisfied with the results. It was an indication that this year's show is going to be one of the best yet held in the interests of fanciers in this district.

"I am firmly convinced," said Mr. Andrews, "that this show will give to the fanciers of this country a show that will be of more value to them and a show that the city of London will be proud to class among other progressive exhibitions. Furthermore, there will be of such value to the fanciers that they can head their advertising with these winnings and risk no money on the venture."

Every fancier who has made an entry is to visit the show personally and see the high quality of birds being shown. It is not considered enough just to make an entry and then forget all about the exhibition. All birds entered must be in the show room not later than 10 p.m. on Monday, it is announced, and no entry may be removed before 9:30 o'clock on Thursday evening, Oct. 29.

The Judges and their classes, as announced by the association, are as follows: R. Oke, Orpingtons, all Rocks except Barred, Continental, all Mediterranean, Game and Game Bantams; E. R. Durand, all Wyandottes, Rhode Island Reds, and Whites; Thomas J. Kiley, Asiatics, French, Hamburgs, Poles, and Ornamental Bantams; James McCormick, Barred Rocks, Donald, and all varieties of pigeons; H. E. Storey, rabbits and caviar.

The following extracts from the general rules and regulations are of importance: All premiums, general and special, except club membership specials, are open to the competition of the world.

The latest edition of the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection shall be the guide of the judges in awarding prizes.

Marks on Cages.

The show hall will be open at the reception of specimens October 26, 1925, and those not received by 10 o'clock on Oct. 26 will be barred from competition (but cannot be taken from the hall until the close of the exhibition) unless unavoidably delayed, when, at the direction of the board of directors, they may be admitted to competition. Each specimen competing for a prize must be entered in the name of the real owner. Any attempt to evade this rule will exclude all birds entered by the offending party from the classes if discovered in time, and if not, the premium money will be withheld.

The association reserves the right to reject entries. Card showing the pen number will be attached to the cages in the show room by the superintendent. On the other neck or sign shall be placed upon the cages by anyone until the judging is completed and the judges have attached the award cards, and no time during the show will any decoration objectionable to the management be allowed.

The decision of the judges shall be final. No protest will be considered except for absolute fraud. Our judges are competent and honest, and petty tricks and fault-finding are the result of the above computation, the prize will be awarded to the largest entry; in case of a tie on pairs the best male will decide.

The association reserves the right to employ additional judges. The show will be judged by the comparison method.

Five ribbons prizes will be awarded in all classes of poultry: pigeons and pet stock, three ribbons. All prizes offered on best exhibit, etc., shall be awarded according to the following scale of points, unless otherwise stated:

First prize, six points; second, four points; third, three points; fourth, two points; fifth, one point. Pairs double the above. Should a result from the above computation, the prize will be awarded to the largest entry; in case of a tie on pairs the best male will decide.

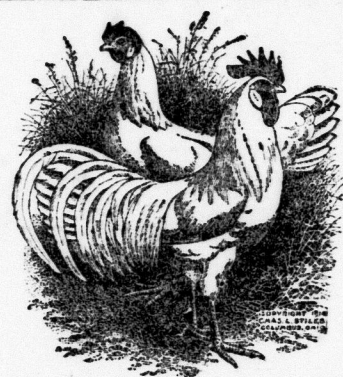
In order to compete for and gain special prizes offered for best exhibit, best display and like, unless otherwise specified, exhibitor must show six entries in the single entry classes, or equal to six single entries. The association will provide all cages, except those for wild birds, which will be returned to the original shipper.

Protect Property. Poultry showing symptoms of sickness or disease at any time will be immediately taken from the show-room and cared for and the owner notified or the birds returned to him, otherwise no specimen, except by the consent of the superintendent and secretary, shall be removed from the hall during the exposition. No birds will be allowed in the hall except those regularly entered.

The association will not be responsible for any loss that may occur; but all specimens consigned to the association's care will receive the best care that intelligent attendants can give; and all paths will be taken to safeguard the exhibit. Watchmen and police will be on duty day and night.

Three will face trial in Oxford. High Constable Hill of Oxford county is expected to arrive at the county jail this afternoon to take back to Woodstock Harold Bridge-water, Simcoe, and Mrs. Minnie Smith and Mrs. Annie Schram of Woodstock, who were arrested last night at Dutton by High Constable Wharton and Constable Nelson of the R.C.M.P., at the request of Mr. Hill.

Mr. Smith, it is alleged, abandoned four children who are at present being cared for by the Children's Aid society of Woodstock. Mrs. Schram and Bridge-water were interviewed by the former's husband, who is anxious for explanations as to their conduct.

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THREE WILL FACE TRIAL IN OXFORD

High Constable Makes Arrest of Man and Two Women at Dutton.

HALF-BROTHER ASKS ACCOUNTING OF MONEY

Case Will Come Up Before Justice Lennox On Monday.

George Woolcox, administrator of the estate of the late William Woolcox, is suing Clara French, a daughter of the deceased, and his own half-sister, for an accounting of her father's money, spent, he claims, by her from September, 1922, until March, 1924. The case will come up for trial before Mr. Justice Lennox at the fall assizes, opening next Monday at the court house.

Mr. Woolcox, in his statement of claim, alleges that the defendant took advantage of her father's infirmities and paid out large sums with consequent damage to the estate.

The defendant denies all charges of breach of trust and declares that her father was quite capable of transacting business. Buchner, Ramsay for plaintiff, and Cameron, Grant & Cameron, St. Thomas, for defendant.

CHARITIES BENEFIT FROM WILL OF FRANCIS BERNARD

Four London charitable institutions benefit by the will of the late Francis Bernard of West London, who left a total estate of \$11,000. The Sick Children's Hospital, the Home for Incurables, Salvation Army and Wednesday Orphans' Home each receive \$100, as does Rev. Canon Sage of St. George's Anglican church.

Mr. Bernard left \$1,000 for a monument to be erected to the memory of his parents in St. John's cemetery, London township, and provided for a \$300 monument for himself in Mount Pleasant cemetery.

PRAYERS FOR GUIDANCE IN ELECTIONS OFFERED

Special prayers for the divine guidance of the electors in the election on Thursday were offered up in all Anglican churches yesterday by the order of His Lordship Bishop Williams. The same action was taken in every diocese of the dominion.

At all celebrations of holy communion on St. Simon and St. Jude's day, which on Wednesday, prayers to the same end will also be recited.

MOTORIST JAILED FOR SEVEN DAYS

Arrest Follows Accident in Which Doctor's Car Is Slightly Damaged.

Following a motor accident on Saturday night, in which an auto driven by Dr. B. E. Wilson was slightly damaged, Roy Bennett, 25 years old, 1385 Dundas street, held responsible for the collision because of his intoxicated condition while driving, was sentenced to seven days in jail when he appeared before Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in court this morning.

Bennett pleaded guilty to the charge of driving while drunk. He declared it to be his first offence, however, and asked for the minimum sentence. Only slight damage was caused Dr. Wilson's car, the court was told.

James B. Lamb, one of the court's habitual attenders, appeared again today, facing a drunk charge. The cause of his downfall, he said, was the old trouble—drunk.

"It must be the old fine, then," said Magistrate Graydon. "Ten dollars and costs. I would make it more if it were not for the fact that you have been working steadily for the past few months."

Another drunk, arrested by the police over the week-end, pleaded guilty to the charge and paid his fine of \$10 and costs out of court.

Three spears contributed amounts of \$13 each in court today, when they pleaded guilty to travelling at excessive rates of speed.

DISTRICT OFFICER INSPECTS MANY UNITS

Col. Ware Pays Visit to Galt, Woodstock and Kitchener—Military News.

Col. F. B. Ware, D.S.O., V.D., A.A. and Q.M.G. of military district No. 1, inspected militia units at Galt, Woodstock, Kitchener and Guelph during the past week.

A unit of the Canadian Officers' Training Corps will start drills at the O. A. C. as the result of Col. Ware's visit there.

Col. H. M. Jacques, D.S.O., of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, and attached to the department of national defence, Ottawa, has just completed his tour of inspection of the hospitals and medical services in military district No. 1.

A special course in field tactics for officers commenced at Wolsey barracks this morning. Capt. J. I. Dugan, D.C.M., of the North Waterloo and Kitchener regiment, was the first to register.

A revival in the work of the militia in smaller cities and towns is noticeable. Many of the units are now at full strength for the first time in years.

OVERCOAT STOLEN FROM VESTRY AT WESLEY UNITED

During the service at Wesley United church last night an overcoat belonging to Warren Smith, 22 Bruce street, was stolen from the vestry, according to a report filed at police station today.

Similar thefts, reported to have occurred at Egerton street Baptist church several weeks ago, prompted the police department to station an officer in that district during church services last night.

NO JOBLESS AT CHATHAM.

BETTERMENT OF CONDITIONS CREDITED TO CHURCH WORK

Patenaude's Leonine Campaign Dwindling to Lamb-Like Aggressiveness.

B. C. IS UNCERTAIN

Improved living conditions in Canada during the past 20 years are due to the influence of the church on the federal and provincial legislatures, said Dr. T. Albert Moore, of Toronto, preaching at the anniversary services of Calvary United church yesterday.

Dr. Moore declared that the church had not been out of touch with the vital social questions of the day and had been active in regard to much-needed social legislation.

"The legislation of the Dominion of Canada for the first ten years following Confederation was largely given to the protection of material progress and business, the legislation has been more in the interests of the people and the homes. This one fact alone would prove that the church in Canada is not a failure and that it is fulfilling a real need in the country today."

Taking his text from Proverbs 29, verse 18, "Where there is no vision the people perish," Dr. Moore gave five reasons why the church was not a failure in modern civilization. They were: "Because the church exalts human values in life; because the church makes humanity conscious of the presence of God; because the church makes for generally better living conditions; because the church enthrones Jesus in all human activities; and because Jesus Christ is the solution of every human problem."

"People criticizing the church for lack of life and activity and accusing her of failure are usually those who never go to a church," he declared. "Those in touch with the church know that she is doing a great work and achieving great results in behalf of humanity. Where there is no church there can be no civilization and no progress. You will find the church at work in the homes, in the church schools, in seeking social legislation, in the foreign mission fields and in the home fields. Where there is a church there you will find the church carrying the burden of her mission."

"On the other hand, the church is working every day, aiming at better living conditions," he said. "No field of endeavor is overlooked and the statute books at Ottawa show the effect the church has had in the last ten years. The church does all the five things I have named and does them thoroughly. I feel that the church is the most important, because four is the most important, because the church enthrones Christ in all human activities. There are some people who say that the church is the theories of the Bible into business and make a success of it. But I know of businesses where it has been done and where it is a success. The finest motto a businessman can put in his office is, 'Do ye unto others as ye would they should do unto you.' There is nothing in every business being the motto in every business office in Canada except want of faith."

MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE TAKES STUMP IN LAMBTON

Hon. John S. Martin, minister of agriculture, passed through London this morning on his way to East Lambton. Mr. Martin has addressed 22 meetings in the last 16 days.

Another campaigner who passed through the city today was W. S. Haney, M.P.P. for West Lambton. He was on his way home after a speaking tour in Northern Ontario.
