Woodstock, Ont., Nov. 20:—About ten o'clock this evening fire broke out in the Central Hotel stables, in the rear of the hotel. Before the firemen reached the scene the stables were all in a blaze, and before the flames were extinguished the stables were completely destroyed. A cow and a valuable horse were also consumed in the flames. The origin of the fire is unknown. Mr. Davis, proprietor of the hotel, estimates the loss at about \$1, 500; partly covered by insurance.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 20.- Fire broke out in a dime museum in the Bastable block, on East Genesee street, at half-past eleven. An number of business houseswere gutted. The loss is \$100,000.
