LIGHTNING TOUCHES POWDER.

STREATOR, III., July 21.—The powder house of the C. W. and V. Coal Company was struck by lightning at 2.30 a.m., causing a terrible explosion, killing one man and wounding many and demolishing all property for blocks around it. There was not a window left unbroken within half a mile of the explosion.

Not a vestige of the powder house remains, while where it stood is an excavation about sixty feet long, forty feet wide and twenty feet deep.
