

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Minutes of a special meeting of the Board of Education called for general business held in the Library Board room on Thursday, Sept. 13, at 8 p.m. Present, Messrs. J. W. McLaren, chairman; Geo. O. Stephenson, W. E. Fitzgerald, John McKercher, Dr. Howden, C. W. Vail, Dr. Siddall, Dr. McGillicuddy, also Principal Cameron.

The minutes of the special and adjourned meetings of July 13, were read and confirmed.

Howden—McKercher, and carried, that the following accounts be accepted and paid.

High School—Harper Bros., frames \$7.50; John T. Chambers, wood, \$20.00; Geo. M. Hendry Co., supplies \$10.75; John McKercher, supplies \$3.69; Wm. Field, cleaning furnace pipes \$1.25; J. W. McLaren, telephone ac. \$3.28; Geo. O. Stephenson, supplies and repairs \$52.00; J. W. McLaren, advertising and supplies \$69.80.

Public School—Wm. Field repairs 53c; John T. Chambers wood \$60; advertising acct. \$4.83.

A communication was read from J. H. Mahon.

Howden—McLaren, and carried, that Mr. Mahon's communication be received and filed.

Fitzgerald—Vail, and carried, that the High School Principal be allowed to continue in use the following books for school term 1923 and 24. Ontario High School Physical Geography, High School French Grammar and Crawford's Senior Algebra.

Principal Cameron addressed the Board and explained his reason for asking that an additional High School assistant should be engaged. After considerable discussion on this subject it was moved by J. McKercher, sec. by Dr. Howden, and carried, that the Board adjourn till Monday, the 17th inst at 8 p.m.

The Sarnia members were invited to Parkhill on September 21st when the St. John's Chapter of London, will put on the Royal Arch degree on the occasion of the District superintendent's visit.

One Adelaide Township farmer interested in the extent of Sunday automobilism has been keeping track of the number of cars passing his place on the Main Road, from Sarnia to London, and he has come to the conclusion that upwards of 200 cars an hour would not be too high a figure for a fair day.

Alleged to be out of her mind, the woman left Wheatley for Hamilton by train, and on the train she behaved in such a peculiar manner that the police of the latter city were notified and her arrest followed. Physicians examined her in Chatham and found her condition hopeless, recommending her removal to London. The woman was taken to the institution on the day she had set for her third wedding.
