Making Milk Powder-Recent Factor Important changes in the dairy business may be brought about by the extension of the new process of making milk powder. In brief, the method is to pass the milk over hot rollers, from which it is scraped as a thin dry sheet, then sifted into powder and put up in adapted to skim milk or whole milk. and also, it is claimed, to eggs.
