## Obituary.

GEORGE CHUTE.

Once more we are called upon to chronicle the death of one of Springfield's citizens in the person of Mr. George Chute, who passed away Monday, August 26th, after a short illness from pneumonia. The deceased was in his 66th year, being born in Bear River in 1841, and moved to Ontario about 32 years ago, settling on the 9th con. of Malahide. About two years ago, he moved to Springfield, settling on East Street. Besides a widow, two sons, William of Toronto, and Vernon, of Berlin, two daughters and five sisters are left to mourn. He was a member of the A. O. U. W. and C. O. F. in religion, a Methodist, and in politics, a Reformer. The funeral was held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. Mr. Lloyd, of Port Stanley, and Rev. Mr. Miller, of Cootenham, officiating, and was largely attended. The flowers were beautiful, being an anchor from the Workman Lodge, two wreaths with "Fether" and one with "Blue hand," besides many smaller sprays. The interment took place in the Forty cemetery, the Workman Lodge reading their burial service at the grave. Springfield, Ontario, paper. ## FRANCIS KEMPTON.

Mr. Francis Kempton died of heart trouble at his home in Bear River on Thursday, September 5th. He was seventy-two years of age, and leaves three daughters, and two sons to mourn their loss, his wife having passed away some two years ago. Last October he and his daughter went to Denver, Colorado, to spend the winter. Returning last July, he came here to stop a while with his daughter, Mrs. Lillian D. Ruggles, where he was taken sick and kept gradually sinking until death claimed his victim. There was a service at the house on Friday morning last conducted by the Rev. I. A. Corbett, pastor of the Bear River Baptist church, of which he was a member, after which the remains were taken to Kempton, Queens County, for burial.
