Another printing concern, has gone to the wall through the cut-rate process of filling orders. This sort of competition is one which local job-offices everywhere have to contend with. And strange to say, among the last to renounce this is the business people who most resent outside competition in their line.

The McCoy Printing Co., in difficulties, liabilities are estimated at over \$8,000, and the assets at less than \$5,000. The creditors are in Germany, Great Britain, United States and Canada. A landlord's sale under a distress warrant was called for yesterday afternoon, and constable M. Keith was opening the door when Sheriff McQuinn forbade the sale under the absconding debtor's act. Mr. D. L. Welch represented seven creditors, including one British firm for \$2,700 Mr. G. L. Harris represented Mr. E. R. Sillis, who claims certain press and plant under a bill held by the Printing Supplies Agency, who claim the property in the plant. Mr. Sillis has also purchased with his own money the post card store, and is running the job-printing business as well. Constable Keith under the circumstances indefinitely postponed the sale, as nobody cared to bid after the Sheriff's protest. In the meantime Mr. Sillis is carrying on the business with the plant held under the lien—Monitor Times, Jan. 3.

The above wretched failure is the result of selling goods on too small a margin, or perhaps no margin at all. Travellers of other printing establishments complained of the rank competition of this Monitor house in the matter of low prices, and were compelled to see orders pass to the cheap-price concern. The issue of doing business below cost is the injury to legitimate traders for the time and the inevitable bankruptcy, as above, of the slaughter and clutter of prices.

This should be a straight warning to all houses that will cut legitimate trade prices for the sake of a volume of unprofitable business.

Changes Management.

LONDON, January 10.—Lord Strathcona and Lord Mount Stephen are among the subscribers to the million dollar capital of The Times. That the subscriptions are entirely of a non-political character is evidenced by the fact that other subscribers include Lords Brassey and Rothschild, both ardent free-traders. They regard the Times as a great national institution, which it is the pride of Englishmen to retain with all its high national qualities unimpaired. Lord Strathcona, when asked about the deal, replied that he had been a stockholder in the Times for thirty-four years. The paper used them to come to him in the remote parts of Hudson's Bay regions once every year in batches, 300 at a time. Mr. Moberly Bell has already surrendered of the management. The Walter family retains association with the paper, but Mr. Pearson now assumes complete business and general control, and he talks about it as a happy man who is mounting to the height of his ambition. It is stated in the newspaper that Mr. Pearson is ready to sell the Express his London half-penny journal, which he started in imitation of Harmsworth's Daily Mail with considerable success. It is also understood he will drop the Times book war, which cost the Times heavily, especially in the loss of publishers' advertisements.

**JAMES A. BAILEY'S ESTATE**  
WORTH HALF A MILLION.

LONDON, January 10.—The will of James Anthony Bailey, of the circus firm of Burnum and Bailey, who died at Mount Vernon, N. Y., in April, 1907, was admitted to probate here today. The personal estate of Mr. Bailey in England is returned at \$148,250, and the gross value of his property in America is placed at \$458,591. After deducting taxes and the expenses of administration, the net property will be but slightly in excess of \$500,000. This is less than one-third of the estimated amount of Mr. Bailey's property at the time of his death. The entire property is left to his widow.

**Nova Scotia Shareholders in the York Loan Case.**

TORONTO, January 10.—The case of the Nova Scotia shareholders in the York Loan was heard before Justice Kappelle at Osgoode hall this morning, and judgment reserved. C. A. Masten, acting for the Nova Scotia shareholders, had three principal points in argument:

1. That the York Loan charter, granted by Ontario government, must be read subject to constitutional limitation by which the company was prohibited from doing business outside of the province.

2. That the laws of Nova Scotia prohibit such company from doing business without first obtaining license there.

3. That the shareholders of the York Loan did not sanction the carrying on of business outside of the province, as was legally necessary.

Mr. Masten held that the Nova Scotia shareholders had innocently attempted to buy shares which the company had no power to sell and that the transaction was void but not illegal. The company got the shareholders without consideration and therefore they are creditors.

The question now before Mr. Kappelle for decision is of vital interest to all the shareholders of the York Loan. If Mr. Masten wins the case for the Nova Scotia shareholders, it means that all the shareholders outside of Ontario will rank as creditors and have prior claim on the assets of the company. As the total holdings of these people amount to \$500,000, it will materially lessen the amount that will fall to the Ontario shareholders.

**NEWFOUNDLAND PROSPERING.**  
Fast Atlantic Service.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., January 9.—The final session of the present legislature was formally opened by Governor Macdonald this afternoon. The speech from the throne stated that it had been considered advisable to call the legislature together earlier than usual because of several important matters which have arisen for consideration. These include the Labrador boundary dispute which has been referred to the Hague tribunal for arbitration.

The government announced that construction work preliminary to the establishing a fast Atlantic service via Newfoundland, would be begun next summer. During the session of the legislature, the feasibility of establishing a system of age pensions will be considered. The government proposed to allow increased grants for lighthouses, harbor works, wharves and for education in the poorer districts.

**ALIENS LEAVING STATES IN 1907 TOOK WITH THEM MORE THAN \$10,000,000.**

NEW YORK, January 9.—According to the North German Lloyd line, which has made a comparative based on figures of steamship agents, money shipped and railroad fares, more than \$10,000,000 was taken out of the United States by emigrants who returned to their native shores last year. The estimate is that each of the 550,000 foreigners had about \$200 with him. To get away this thing had to put about \$10,000,000 in railroads and steamship transportation and other charges.
