(Continued from last issue) Ordered, that the report of the Committee on Assessment be read and received and adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ASSESSMENT The following is the report:- To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Annapolis Co.:

Upon reading the petition of H.M. Irvine and upwards of twenty others freeholders in the County of Annapolis praying for the opening of a new road beginning at the Main Street in Granville, making use of the right of way between the property of the late Edward Knowles and Captain Norman Berry, continuing across property occupied by E.E. Wade, following the course of Edward Knowles' west line until it comes to the back street.

Ordered that the prayer of said petition be granted and Edward Buckley and William Allen be appointed a Committee to examine into the necessity for said road and report.

Ordered that Councillors Elliott, Thomas and the Clerk be a Committee to revise the jury lists.

Moved by Councillor Haley, seconded by Councillor Grimm that the Warden appoint a Committee of five to investigate the large expenditure being made for the maintenance of the poor outside of our Institution and decide ways and means whereby same can be curtailed if possible, and report tomorrow morning.

Passed. Councillors Haley, Fitch, FitzRandolph, Elliott and Giffitt were named by the Warden as said Committee.

Ordered that Robert J. Potter be refunded three dollars, two years' taxes assessed on his property in Wards 8 and 9. Should have been assessed only on Ward 8.

Ordered that Council adjourn till two o'clock p.m.

Wednesday afternoon All councillors present. Warden in the chair. Minutes of previous meeting read approved.
