#### CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS

NEWFOUNDLAND HOTEL, ST. JOHN'S—WAGES OF EMPLOYEES

On the orders of the day:

Mr. W. J. Browne (St. John's West): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask a question of the Minister of Transport, of which I have sent him a copy. Has any consideration been given to placing the employees of the Newfoundland hotel, at St. John's, Newfoundland, on the same rates of wages as those paid in other Canadian National Railway hotels, and if so, when will the new rates come into effect? Will they be retroactive to October 1, 1949?

Hon. Lionel Chevrier (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, if the hon. member sent notice of his question, I am afraid I did not receive it, although I was in my office all morning. The question involves a legal point which has been given consideration both by officials of the Canadian National Railways and by officials of the Department of Justice, I believe—although I am not too sure of the latter. I shall have to look into the question to ascertain the present position, and give a reply later.
