government mismanagement which destroys the lifestyle of so many important Canadian people.

Certainly this country must ask questions when 20 per cent of our population is considered poor by United Nations standards. In these circumstances there is some reason to ask ourselves what went wrong in the last 40 months of the management of the economy by the Minister of Finance. If we graded the minister by giving him a zero, he might well come to us, appeal to us and say, "Sir, I do not deserve such a grade," and the only thing we could respond to that is that zero is the lowest we give. The responses which the minister gave can be challenged.

Mr. Malone: Mr. Speaker, I should like to share for a moment some other examples of the dangerous things which the government has done to destroy the fabric of life, not only in this country but abroad. It has been mentioned in the budget speech that the government was going to try to enhance development in underdeveloped countries. May I cite one example of how in recent years the government has done exactly the opposite? Although it may now take a different approach, the harsh realities of the recent past are inexcusable.

The country of Tanzania is in the business of farming sisal fibres. Canada was one of the main importers of this fibre which is used for binder and bailing twines in this country. What did the Government of Canada do? It imposed on those people of a developing nation a 22.5 per cent import tax. What it did to them was to destroy their sisal fibre industry which was so important to them, and what it did to the Canadian farmer was to increase the cost of that fibre by 30 per cent, to farmers whose cost of farm machinery and other costs have been accelerating at a tremendously rapid rate.

If there is one thing that is clear, it is the need within the nation to accept the fact that this country must develop a policy with regard to developing countries that will enhance trade—
