If this Bill passes, it will prevent the repetition of a shocking incident during the Central Nova by-election where a Canadian citizen living in the United States was investigated for participating in the by-election.

It is true we did not have any agreement in the words of "an agreement", but there was a general understanding along the lines explained by my colleague from Pontiac-Gatineau-Labelle (Mr. Lefebvre). I regret that this kind of debate is taking place on the floor of the Chamber. Perhaps we could settle it outside the Chamber.

Madam Speaker: At any rate, perhaps that is a good suggestion. I leave it to Hon. Members, but I do have an obligation to ask the House if it will give its unanimous consent to move acceptance of the seven reports on parliamentary reform.

Mr. Nielsen: Without debate.

Madam Speaker: Does the House give its unanimous consent?

Some Hon. Members: Agreed.

Some Hon. Members: No.
