throughout the world in terms of the management of the global commons.

A consortium of business people from the major companies in Canada recently met with me and the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources to get together in a major national mission on hydrogen.

GOVERNMENT EXPENDITURES

Mr. Howard McCurdy (Windsor—Walkerville): Mr. Speaker, when will the Government announce that it has restored the cuts in expenditures for alternative energy and for conservation? How much, when, over what period of time? Will the Government establish the hydrogen authority as asked for in the advisory committee report? When will the Minister establish that committee and how much funding will it be provided? Do not give these general assertions of being in favour of this or that.

Hon. Frank Oberle (Minister of State (Science and Technology)): Mr. Speaker, as usual, it is a very simplistic approach simply to anticipate that one can buy all of these solutions. The fact is that these committees are meeting, discussions are under way.

We have just announced \$1.3 billion of new spending for science and technology. Five hundred and forty million dollars will go into universities for fundamental research. There will be a centres of excellence program. There is no doubt in my mind that energy will be one of the areas which Canadian scientists will want to study and develop linkages to leaders in various disciplines throughout the world. I could go on forever. The fact is that we are acting and measurable progress is being made. The Hon. Member just refuses to acknowledge it.

FISHERIES

ARREST OF SPANISH FISHING VESSELS OFF NEWFOUNDLAND

Mr. Morrissey Johnson (Bonavista—Trinity—Conception): Mr. Speaker, two Spanish fishing vessels were arrested off the coast of Newfoundland over the weekend for alleged illegal fishing inside Canada's 200-mile zone in 1985. Will the Acting Minister of Fisheries fill in the details of the arrest and what has transpired since the vessels were apprehended?

Hon. John C. Crosbie (Minister for International Trade): Mr. Speaker, I am delighted to have a chance to praise the

officials of the Department of Fisheries and Oceans for this magnificent piece of work. On Saturday two Spanish trawlers were sighted by a specially equipped Beach Craft King air surveillance aircraft operating out of St. John's, owned by Mr. Tom Collingwood's firm, and leased to the Department of Fisheries and Oceans. It was determined that arrest warrants were outstanding for the two vessels and the captains.

The Leonard J. Cowley patrol vessel was alerted to intercept these two vessels and board them to determine whether the two captains were the same as those named in the warrants. It successfully intercepted the two Spanish trawlers on Sunday and first arrested the Lenengoa and its captain and then the Bigarena and arrested her captain. They were brought into St. John's at four o'clock Sunday afternoon.

It turned out that both captains had been wanted since 1985 for alleged offences that have occurred in our waters. This was a magnificent piece of work, as was the apprehension of the American vessel that attempted to steam away with four of our officers onboard but was intercepted by a second vessel with an armed patrol party. All of these measures were instituted by the present Minister of Fisheries and Oceans.

CANADIAN POLICY—SOUTH AFRICAN ATHLETES

If she is referring to any specific case as far as our policy applies to South African athletes, the policy that we have laid out is not always easy to apply but we have done our best.

Perhaps she is referring to the case of two tennis players that was brought up in *The Toronto Star*. If that is the case, I can only inform the Hon. Member that the two athletes to whom she is referring have never asked for visas to enter Canada.
