Mr. Campbell said that the Detroit factory will handle the 200,000 production planned for 1940. The factory requires 1,400,000 lamps, 800,000 ball bearings, 30,000 tons of steel, hides from 100,000 animals for upholstery, the bodies for the 200,000 automobiles, 100,000 tires, 100,000 batteries from 6,000 hogs to stuff the seats, 100,000 wheels, 100,000 spokes, 100,000 bolts for wheel spokes, nearly 2,000,000 square feet of glass for the windshield, 100,000 square feet of glass for the rear window, 100,000 castings, 2,000,000 cubic feet of gas, 100,000 cubic feet of oil.

It had been kept active and busy all the time. Nearly two thousand new members had been added to the roll. The total membership was 16,872.
