## **BAD OUTLOOK FOR**

Firmness of Liverpool Cables Encouraged Sharp Upturn at Chicago.

Bullish sentiment received fresh impetus when the day's primary receipts were announced as amounting only to a third of the total a year ago. Buying of Canadian wheat for Burfialo millers, who are in the exsport flour trade, exercised a signit restaining influence, but was later more than offset by the strength at Winnipeg, alleged to be the result of purchasing orders from Buenos Ayres.

Profit-taking, however, on a large scale, gave the market a weak tone at the last.
