PARIS, Sept. 3, 5.35 p.m.-Adjutant Bertin, of the French aviation corps, and awarded the decoration of the Legion of Honor for alighting behind the German lines and bringing back in afety Adjutant Boyer, who was com-pelled to set fire to his machine as the result of an accident. Both aviators were engaged in re-

connoitring expeditions in the same direction. Bertin's landing point was bout four miles beyond that of Boyer. On returning after executing his mis sion, Bertin saw Boyer's machine in flames. He landed in face of a heavy fire, picked up his comrade, and flew back to the French lines, with a fragment of a shell in his thigh. The aeroplane was struck in 98 places by bullets and pieces of shells.
