That men, mostly of desperate fortunes, embarked in a system of universal oppofition to government, should eagerly seize the opportunity of joining in the cry of fedition and rebellion, is a consequence naturally flowing from the consederacy of such spirits; but that a minister of the gospel of peace, the minister of a doctrine which inculcates charity, benevolence, and obedience to superiors, should so far depart from the steps in which his Divine Master, and his disciples uniformly trod, is matter of astonishment to many, and of indignation to some.

The Doctor, however, engages in the field of difpute with great advantages over his opponents in respect to the majority of his American readers. His constant references to Providence \*; his fancy of feeing
