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HARNESS HORSE RECORDS

SEVEN YEARLINGS DO 2.30

Interesting Notes of the Trotters and Pacers—Training For Ice Meetings.

Seven yearlings have trotted to records of 2.30 or better the past season. Four of the seven were by sires that trace directly to Electioneer, 123, thru Burgin (2.04), two trace to Alcyon (2.22), thru McKinney (2.15), and the other to Artie (2.22), thru Axworthy (2.14). Kenrick Todd, 3 (2.28), got three of them, viz.: Frances Todd (2.24), The Baronet (2.24), and K. L. Todd (2.28). The other four were all by different sires; Kenney Lou (2.24), got Wilbur Lou, 1 (2.19); Bessie got Bessie, 1 (2.24); McKinney got McKinney Mac, 1 (2.24); and Axworthy, 3 (2.15), got Dandy G., 1 (2.24).

Urban (1.58), the trotting king, is now quartered in Mr. Billings' stable at Glenview. His shoes have been pulled off and he is allowed the run of the paddock. It is estimated that the California racing station, Copa de Oro, by Nutwood Wilke, was assisted by a runner to front for a good part of the mile in which he paced in 1.40 on the opening day of the Phoenix, Ariz. meeting.

It is interesting to compare this year's catalog of the Old Glory sale with those of a dozen years ago. It shows how much improvement has been made in breeding. Short pedigrees are scarce in this year's catalog.

It certainly looks as though there is a fine opportunity for some trainer who is located in the delighting belt to open a winter training stable for youngsters. There is no better place to break and educate youngsters than over the snow and they are likely to make speed and growth as they would be they sent to southern training points; in fact, if they are properly housed and fed there is less liability to sickness. It takes more feed, however, and the man who thinks that meadow hay is the proper thing to make bone and muscle is not the one to send your youngster to.

The free-for-all racing events over the half mile track will be pretty tough pick-fest next season. The horses are better than ever and the racing is better than ever (or a number of seasons past).

Reports from all sections of the country are to the effect that the demand for finished horses is growing stronger every day. Saddle horses are especially in demand and trotters and pacers are eagerly snapped up at fair prices.

When a horse has been galled or scarred, keep the sore well greased with salt butter and the hair will come in the same color as before the galling was done.

It is said that C. W. Williams, breeder of Artie (2.12), and Allerton (2.04), will earn about \$40,000 on his wheat farm situated in the Canadian west.

Wilbur Lou (2.19) is the seventh yearling to beat 2.30 this season and that's going some.

Native Belle (2.04) will be bred to Justice Brooke, 2 (2.04), champion to champion, and the produce should beat a flying machine.

Walter Cox has a promising two-year-old by Locand (2.05) in his stable at Dover. The youngster is owned by Chas. Worthington of Danville, Ky., and is out of a mare by Joe Patchen (2.04), second dam Lottie Loaring (2.04).

Tidy Peter, a 2-year-old trotting colt by Peter the Great (2.04), out of Altara Wilke, by Patchen Wilke (2.24), trotted 2.24 in 2.27 at Lexington, recently, and later went the distance in 2.19. It is probable that this youngster has had less work than any colt of his age at the Lexington track, for he was not turned over to a trainer until about Oct. 23, though brushed a little before that time.
