MONTREAL, July 21.—"So far as Canadian steamships are concerned, no arrangements have been made for an increase in rates, either for passengers or freight, as the result of the increased wages to various employes since the recent seamen's strike," said an official of the Canadian Pacific Railway on his return from a business trip to England to-day.

As far as he knew, nothing had been done, and he was not in a position to predict a change. He had heard nothing which could serve to confirm the statements that the North Atlantic conference were about to raise passenger rates to counterbalance increased expenditure caused by the granting of wage

His trip, he said, had not been made with the object of playing a part in the labor disputes, but to procure new steamships. As a result, two new steamships for the Pacific, to be delivered in the spring of 1913, had been ordered. These are to be much superior to the present vessels. They are to average 18 knots an hour and to make 20 on their trial trips. They will have a tonnage of 15,000, will be capable of carrying 1300 passengers, and will cost in the neighborhood of \$2,500,000 each. The new vessels will be put on the Vancouver service, and a fortnightly service will be inaugurated. One of the present Empresses will be taken off that service and placed on another Pacific route.
