WORKMAN  
BADLY INJURED

John Egan May Die of Injuries  
Sustained While Unloading  
Poles in Ward  
Seven.

While unloading a shipment of  
concrete hydro-electric poles at the  
substation in Edwin-avenue yesterday  
John Egan, one of the teamsters of the  
commission, was seriously injured, and  
at a late hour last night his recovery  
was doubtful. The skidway down  
which the poles were being lowered  
was struck by a pole which fell  
and struck Egan on the temple  
and the head of one of them flew up-  
ward, striking Egan on the temple  
and immediately summoned and the  
injured man was removed to his  
lounge at 206 Brock-avenue, where  
Dr. McGeorge, of 205 Spadina-ave.,  
attended him. His condition grew  
worse and he was taken to Western  
Hospital, where it was found that he  
was suffering from a depressed  
fracture of the skull.

The Keeso-street firemen were called  
out to Hannymede yesterday after-  
noon to a fire at the home of Mrs. M.  
Parker on Gertrude-avenue. The  
blaze started from a leak in the pipe  
feeding the gas range and quickly  
spread along the woodwork. The  
Hannymede brigade were sum-

damage was done. The house was

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND RESERVATIONS.

A person who is the sole head of a  
family, or any male over 18 years  
old, may homestead a quarter section  
of available Dominion land in Manitoba,  
Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant  
must appear in person at the Dominion  
land office in the province to which he  
wishes to apply. Entry by proxy may be made  
at any of the following offices: by father,  
mother, son, daughter, brother or  
sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Must reside upon and  
cultivation of the land in each of three  
years. A homesteader may live within  
five miles of his homestead on a farm  
of at least 80 acres solely owned and  
occupied by him or by his father, moth-  
er, son, daughter, brother or sister.

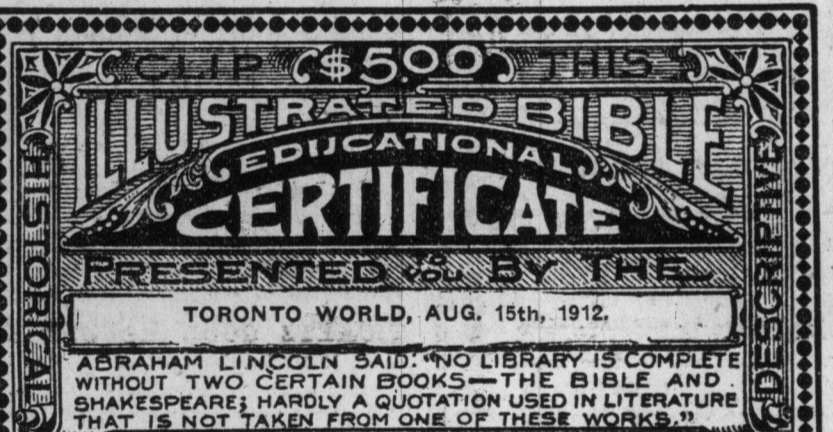
