HAMILTON HAPPENINGS TWO CHURCHES OPENED

Methodist and Catholics Have Dedicator Services—Two Deaths.

Hamilton, May 13.—(Special.)—Mrs. Ruth E. Kennedy, mother of the wife of the late Rev. T. J. Parr, died this evening at the parsonage of the Hamilton-street Methodist Church in her 67th year. She leaves two sons, Wellington E., Chicago, and A. E. Kennedy, Jordan, and one daughter, Mrs. Parr. The funeral takes place Tuesday afternoon.

The new Roman Catholic Church, St. Anne's, at Sherman-avenue and Barton-street, was opened and dedicated this morning by Bishop Dowling. A procession headed by the bishop and the dignitaries marched around the church three times. The bishop celebrated Pontifical Mass, which was assisted by Rev. Fathers Burke, Donovan, Mahony and Lenhardt.

A new Methodist Church at Crown Point was opened this afternoon and dedicated by Rev. J. H. Robinson, president of the Hamilton conference. Rev. Dr. Rose presided. Rev. H. E. Rowe will be the first pastor. The following trustees were appointed: J. M. Peregrine, Thos. S. Morris, J. H. Waterbury, Fred Coote and Thos. Loveloy.

It is stated now that the Hamilton Steamboat Company has been bought out by the Mackenzie & Mann interests. Robert Dow, 79 Bay-street, died this afternoon in his 74th year. He was a well-known contractor. He leaves a widow, two sons, James, New York, and Henry, Hamilton, and one daughter, Mrs. Thos. Allen Jr.

LIGHTNING DESTROYS CHURCH

Edifice on Mohawk Reserve, Near Deseronto, Burned to Ground.

Deseronto, May 13.—During the fierce electrical storm which passed over this section of the country to-night the English Church situated on the Mohawk reserve about one mile west of Deseronto was completely demolished. The lightning struck the northwest corner of the structure, lighting the frame work, and unfortunately, a heavy wind from the west fanned the flames the entire length of the building.

Relief was sent out from Deseronto, but as there was no water within reach they could offer no resistance to the flames. The beautiful stained glass window presented by Hon. Dr. Oronhyatekwa was entirely destroyed, but nearly all the fixtures were removed.

This church was a very old one and has an interesting history. The congregation had in their possession a communion set innocently presented by the many of the chiefs and their families of this tribe of Mohawks here buried within its burial grounds.

The storm was the worst that has occurred in this vicinity for some time.

Barn Destroyed.

Waterloo, May 12.—A short but sharp electrical thunderstorm passed over this town and surrounding country this morning, and the lightning struck the large barn of Joseph Snider, farmer, near the town, and the fire completely destroyed the barn and some stock and implements. Loss about \$2,500. The owner and family were absent in town during the time.

show up better than a better grade of oil, if the lamp is properly manipulated," he said. Using a lamp which had been prepared for the purpose, he illustrated.

Scientific Cheating. "We were fighting the National Light Oil Company," Mr. Moon, and these are the tricks I used. In making a test with a poor grade of oil we are instructed to take a lamp with a shallow bowl. Put oil within the shallower the bowl the better. For our competitor's oil we were told to take a new chimney, and an old chimney for our own. There is in chimney a certain amount of magnesia, which, when heated, turns the glass dark, making it look as if the oil burned with a sooty flame. After, while this magnesia burns off, and therefore, with a new chimney, the competitor's oil looked as if it gave a smoky flame, while ours burned bright and clear.

"In trick No. 2 we dried both wicks carefully. For our own oil we left lamps to give a good oil, and the competitor's oil we dampened it about half an inch with saliva. This burning test was used in making a time burning test. When the competitor's wick burned down to the moistest wick there it no longer would burn freely; there it no longer would die down, while with our dry wick it would keep on burning as brightly as ever.

Makes Competition Look Yellow. "Trick No. 3 was devised to make the flame yellower than the slightly, and that of the competitor yellow and smoky. To do this we trimmed the wick of the competitor's lamp so that it had a narrow burning surface, that it had a narrow burning surface, the top having a sharp edge. The lamps were then placed side by side in front of a white background. White box covers or cloth was put over the lamps to give this background, and then, when the lamps were lighted, the competitor's flame would be a thick yellow flame while our flame would be clear, and white and pleasant to the eye.

"With our fourth trick we made the wick of our competitor's lamp char, and the flame weak and uncertain. This was an easy trick. The wick which we burned in our competitor's oil was left long, so that it curled around the inside of the bowl of the lamp. This made the siphoning more difficult, as the oil had to travel farther. With our oil, however, we used a short wick that stuck straight down into the oil. The wick siphoned much quicker, and while the other wick was charring before the oil got to the top, our wick was burning evenly with a slight flame.

"In order to get a perfect light the chimney must fit around the bottom of the burner snugly. Our fifth trick was to bend the base of the chimney slightly, so that the current of air would get in under the chimney, and that would easily convince anyone that the competitor's oil was better. Of course, the chimney in the lamp which contained our oil would fit snugly, and we could show a good flame.

Sixth Trick Performed. "The sixth trick was a neat one, but it had to be manipulated carefully. In our case we carried a little dirty flour, and we would have a little on our fingers when we got the wick of the competitor's oil. With this flour we stopped up some of the air holes under the burner, shutting off the draft. Of course, in our lamp the air holes would be nice and clean, and the difference in the flames was all to our advantage.

Hibbs testified that he had practised these tricks at Aledo, Farmington, Keithsburg, and West Jersey, Ill., and with considerable success. "Did you get any information for the Standard by illegitimate methods?" Hibbs was asked.

"I frequently did so. I was, for example, instructed to get the bills of lading of the Royal Oil Company at Monmouth, Ill. I secured them by allowing a man to steal an amount a month and the Standard paid me for this information."

"Give us the names of some of the men you thus bribed?" "I can remember only one name at this time, and that is McCoy, who was a freight handler in the freight houses of the Iowa Central Road. I was instructed by my superiors not to try to learn names of men bribed, and if I did to forget them, as soon as possible. I tried to follow these instructions, but I can go and pick out all of the men to whom I paid money for this information."

"In what way did you receive this information?" "Most frequently it was mailed me at Peoria and sometimes it was handed me on a piece of paper. Often I secured exact copies of the bills of lading of the independent company."

Forgot the Names. "Who furnished you with the bribe money?" "E. E. Lashley, who was the company's special agent at Peoria, and who was for a time the manager of the district. He was the man who told me the names of the men to whom I paid money, as he did not want to get into any trouble from it."

"Did you have anything to do with crime or graft in taxes?" "I was frequently sent to stations to get a low tax value. At Galesburg I was asked to get."

JUDGE BABY DEAD. Montreal, May 13.—(Special.)—Judge Baby, formerly of the court of appeals, died to-day.

JUMPS TO HIS DEATH. Ottawa, May 13.—John Briden, aged 20, was drowned at Quyon, Que., Saturday.

He jumped from the steamer Pique, to make the log boom and missed it, going into the water instead. His body was recovered about half an hour after he went into the water.

WORK RESUMES TO-DAY. Scranton, May 13.—Work will be resumed to-morrow at practically all the anthracite collieries. All of the imported men have been shipped away, and almost all evidence of their occupation of the collieries has been removed.
