MORE MONEY IS NEEDED FOR FOSTER DEVELOPMENT

Shareholders Decide To Sell Treasury Stock—Experts' Reports Are Satisfactory—Jackson Booth of Ottawa, and W. H. Fisher, of Montreal, are Added to Directorate.

There was a tinge of anxiety apparent at a big meeting of the Foster mine shareholders in McConkey's early last evening. The stock that was once selling at 100, had dropped to 70, and it seemed as if the mine was in a bad way. It was a special meeting called to discuss matters generally. The utmost good feeling prevailed, and after discussion and reading of experts' reports had shown that the mine was in good shape, but needed more money, it was decided to empower the directors to issue, according to their discretion, the \$100,000 of treasury stock to shareholders, and to the shareholders to be made at once, and the acceptance to be received in cash by July 1st.

Nothing detrimental to the mine, excepting lack of capital, was brought out. No further dividends will be paid on the earnings so far.

The experts gave a most favorable view of the situation, and the shareholders seemed satisfied.

Two new directors were added, Messrs. Jackson Booth and W. H. Fisher, of Montreal, and W. H. Fisher, of Montreal, are added to the directorate.

MINING INDUSTRY IN '06 REACHED HIGHEST MARK

Annual Report of Minister of Lands and Mines—Grants to Veterans 13,000.

In the report for 1906 of the minister of lands, forests and mines, just issued, it is stated that 400 military land grant certificates were issued during the year, bringing the total number up to 13,000. Location certificates were issued to 500, making in all 2,202. During the year 320 locations were made, nearly all in Abitibi, and making 520 altogether. There are still about 5000 to be provided for, allowing for 1400 surrendered at \$20 each.

During the year 69,880 acres of crown lands were sold for \$72,299. For mining purposes 477 acres were sold for \$1,388. There was collected on this account \$118,244.

The answers to questions there were 13,384 acres for \$13,177, and on this account there was collected \$46,621.

Encouraging Reports.

Extracts were quoted from Mr. Loring's report, showing that the prospects in some places the thickness of the ore was rather remarkable, and in eight, "we saw \$80,000 worth of silver in sight." ROYAL HONORS GOING TO CANADA

Montrealer Knighted and Ontario's Lieut.-Governor One of Several Receiving Letters.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable)
LONDON, June 27.—The King's birthday honors are announced as follows: "Baronetcy, Col. Ivor Herbert, ex-locum major-general of Canada. Knighthood, Nathaniel Dunlop, chairman of the Allan line. Order of St. Michael and St. George, Grand Cross, Sir William MacGregor, governor of Newfoundland. Knight Commander, Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick. Companions, James Stewart Pitt, Newfoundland; Capt. R. H. Anstruther, R.N.; Alfred Duclos de Celles, Martin Joseph Griffin. Knight Bachelor, William Mortimer Clark, P. C. S. Langlois, Robt. Gillespie Reid (all as before). Royal Victoria Order of Knight Commander, Earl Dundonald, Sir T. G. Shaughnessy.

The baronetage is often accounted the lowest grade of the major nobility. Col. Ivor John Corrado Herbert, upon whom a baronetcy has been bestowed, was born in 1831 and has had a notable military career. He entered the Grenadier Guards 1850, served in the Egyptian campaign with distinction in 1882, and in Nile expedition 1884-5; was military attaché at St. Petersburg 1888-9, and commanded the Canadian militia 1890 to 1895, also as commander of colonial troops in England for the Queen's Jubilee 1897. He served in South Africa and was awarded honors from the German emperor, the King of Italy and the legion of honor from France.

Nathaniel Dunlop is one of the best known of Montreal's business men and chairman of the board of directors of the Allan Line has been brought into touch with transportation and mercantile interests the country over. Sir William MacGregor, K.C.M.G., was born in Scotland in 1847. He has been governor of Newfoundland since 1894. His career in the public service has been a long one. He was connected with the medical institutions of England and Scotland for some years. His chief honors are a baronetcy, Western Pacific, or British New Guinea, and of Lagos.

Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, formerly minister of justice, now chief justice of the supreme court, was born in Quebec in 1823. He was admitted to the bar in 1847. He entered political life in 1850, and held his seat until 1856, when he entered federal politics. He was solicitor-general for a time, afterwards becoming minister of justice. He was elevated to the bench in 1900.

Hon. Francois Charles Langlois, C.C., was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, July 24, 1836. Came to Canada in 1859, and was called to the bar in 1861, created K.C. in 1867, and succeeded Sir Oliver Mowat as lieutenant-governor of Ontario.

Hon. Francois Charles Langlois, C.C., was born at St. Rose, O., 1838, called to bar 1861, and left for Paris, where he qualified for a chair in law faculty of Laval University. He has been a distinguished member of the Quebec bar, and was secretary of the first colonization society in Canada. He was mayor of Quebec, 1882, 1890, and afterwards member of the Quebec legislature. In 1884 he entered the house of commons. He was a member of the Joly cabinet, Quebec, 1878-1889.

Robert Gillespie Reid was born in Perthshire, Scotland. He went to Australia in 1865, and in 1871 came to America, superintending the building of the international bridge crossing the Niagara River, near Buffalo. He entered the cabinet, Quebec, 1878-1889.

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
