Glasgow, Nov. 6.-In a speech delivered here to-night John Morley, formerly Chief Secretary for Ireland, eulogized Lord Rosebery. He said he could not discover such a divergence between Lord Rosebery and the Liberal party's views regarding the Armenian question as to justify Lord Rosebery in severing himself from the eadership. Regarding the internal

leadership. Regarding the internal difficulties that had prevailed in the Rosebery Ministry, Mr. Morley said that such troubles arose in all Cabinets. They were merely passing differences, like those that sometimes sprang up between a husband and wife.

Continuing, Mr. Morley said that the chief question before the Liberals was the leadership of the party in the House of Commons. No change, he declared, was mooted there. He dilated upon Sir William Harcourt's capacity and manner, his language implying that he advocated the giving of the leadership of the party to Sir William.

MARTIAL LAW PROCLAIMED.

Mayor Albuquerque is Making Things Lively in Mexambique

Lisbon, Nov. 6.—The Tempo says that Major Monsinho, Albuquerque, Governor of Mozambique, has suspended the constitution, dissolved the municipal council and proclaimed martial law. He has also arrested three aldermen, including a brother of a judge of the Supreme Court at Loando, on the charge of supplying arms and munitions to the Namorallos, a tribe of natives with whom the Portuguese are at war. The prisoners are awaiting trial in the fortress at Mozambique. Their offense is punishable by death.

Major Albuquerque, who recently led an expedition into Manicaland, was surprised by 2000 Namoralles and was compelled to retreat after fighting 22 hours. The Portuguese force comprised 300 natives of Portugal and 180 blacks. Two of the Portuguese were killed and Major Albuquerque and 34 other members of the expedition were wounded. The loss inflicted on the Namorallos was heavy.
