rant, But He Must Stay in Jail and Serve His Sentence.

TORONTO.

Mr. Justice MacMahon has given judgment in the Queen v. Morrison afias Conlon. The prisoner was arrested and committed on July 1 on a charge of stealing 70 cents and a handkerchief. He was afterwards, on July kerchief. He was afterwards, on July 28, tried by the county judge without a jury. He pleaded not guilty, but was sentenced to three months' imprisonment at hard labor. Justice MacMahon decides that the warrant was invalid, as July 1 is what is called a dies 'on, like Sunday, and a British subject cannot be tried and convicted either on a Sunday or dies non, But in this case, as the trial and conviction were on July 28, the prisoner is properly in jail and must serve his sentence. The motion for discharge of prisoner is therefore dismissed.

Mr. Justice Falconbridge gave judgment in Tooth v. Johnston. The defendant claimed that her brother, the late T. A. Keefer, barrister, was indebted to her, and in payment of the claim conveyed an interest in certain mining land in Thunder Bay district to her husband. After her husband's death she, as executrix of his will, conveyed this interest to herself personally. The plaintiff had a judgment of \$16,000 against defendant's deceased husband, and brings this action to have the interest sold, notwithstanding the conveyance and proceeds paid on the judgment. Justice Falconbridge thinks that the evidence shows that the debt to defendant by her deceased brother was paid by him in his lifetime, and that the plaintiff is entitled to succeed, and accordingly gives judgment in his favor, with costs against defendant personally. Tooth v. Johnston.

Mr. Justice MacMahon will hear motions set down for next Tuesday, Aug. 31. on Thursday or Friday next at 10 a.m. Otherwise they will be put on the list for Thursday, Sept. 2.

The new rules of court, which come into force on Sept. 1, as to vacation do not alter the old rule, which provides that long vacation shall consist of the months of July and August.







