

Detroit, Aug. 15.—David Henry John son, the youngest of the four Johnson brothers, notorious counterfeiters, was ar brothers, notorious counterfeiters, was arrested early this morning at the house of Joseph J. Wetherail, farmer, living two miles from Blenheim, kent County, Canada. Johnson was locked up at Police Headquarters at Windsor. He was the third of the family to be arrested in this city within the last week. Two of the other brothers, Charles and Edmund, were arrested here Friday. The fourth brother, John, allas "Shang," Johnson, is in Kingston Penitentiary, Canada. Young Johnson is known to the police and secret service as the most dangerous man in this country, and the whole family were artists in their line. The man arrested yesterday eluded even suspicion for the last 10 years. The official secret service say there is positive official secret service say there is positive proof that David Johnson, though only 35 years old, was the author of counterfeit bills in 1888, and the authorities have been looking for the man who did this job ever since the bills first came into circulation. The bills in question are \$2^{+}\$ notes.
