Health Officers at Halifax at Once Took Action.

Russia to Canada. The steamer Lake Superior, which got into port this afternoon from Batoum with 2000 of the Russian emikrants on board, reported an outbreak of smallpox on the voyage, from which one death occurred four days ago. The victim was buried at sea.

Dr. Carieton Jones, one of the health officers of the port, shouted from the deck of the Lake Superior: "Keep off; there is smallpox on board. Those on the little steamers needed no further caution. The noses of the craft were quickly turned city wards and without venturing any nearer to the disease-stricken ship, they made their way back to their docks. The Government steamer Argus had reached the Lake Superior shortly before this and placed Dr. Jones on the immigrant-laden vessel. Dr. McKay, Chief Health Officer, who was also

The Trip From Batoum.

The Lake Superior made a fairly good run from Batoum. Having sailed on the 22nd inst., she reached Haifax four days quicked than the Lake Huron, which brought the first detachment of Doukhobors. She displayed no quarantine flag as she entered the harbor, and it was then supposed that her big crowd of passengers were free from disease. The presence of smallbox on board will necessitate the detention of the entire lot here for at least three weeks.

The quarantine laws provide for the detention of passengers from a disease-infected ship for a period of at least 21 days, but if any further cases of smallpox develon the time must be extended.

No New Cases.

The case of smallpox which proved fatal is the only one which has appeared among the immigrants so far, but as this case was not isolated it is feared that others will develop. The victim who died four days ago was a child, 8 years of age, in whom the disease developed twelve days after the steamer left Batoum, and where it is supposed to have been contracted. The sufferer was not isolated, because the doctor at first believed it to be a case of measles.

Three deaths from ordinary causes also occurred on the voyage, one being of an old man from exhaustion and another of a woman from heart failure and the third of a child.

Tolstoi's Son on Board.

Count Sergius Tolstol, son of the famous Count Leo Tolstol, is with this party of Doukhobors, and, like the rest, will have to stay in quarantine. Prince Hilkoff arrived here to-day to welcome the Lake Superior's passengers, but it is doubtful if he will visit Lawlor's Island for some days. When the Lake Superior arrived a gang of men were at work on the island, engaged in the crection of a kitchen in connection with the inmigrant quarters. With them was a Government official from Ottawa, superintending the work. They no sooner heard of the smallpox case on the steamer than they abandoned the work and made to the mainland with all possible despatch, refusing to remain on the island. If men can be secured in the city to-morrow they will be taken to the quarantine station to erect additional buildings, so that the entire party of Doukhobors can be provided win shelter away from the Lake Superior.

The reason is unknown, but in all probability it is due to earthquake. The town of Porus, the inland terminus of the Central Line of the Jamaica Railroad, has been almost destroyed by fire, involving heavy losses. There were no fatalities, however. The fire raged unopposed, owing to the want of water.
