WILL THE BANDS NOT PLAY?

A Jarring Note Has Disturbed the Harmony That Was Wanted For Park Concerts

EXODUS TO CITY PALACE GOES ON.

Hudson Bay Commission and the C. P. R.—Jobs to Let on Fire Brigade.

It looks now as though there would be no band concerts at all this summer. The bands in their struggle for a good share of the city's \$1500 appropriation have acted like Irish political factions. Union bands striving to shut out one non-union band, five military bands combining against a civilian organization, and over and above all the three city regimental bands boy-ally cutting everything else in sight, would almost drive a cooler-headed man than Chairman Score of the committee to despair. But the chairman cannot by any possible combination of circumstances be driven to such a resource, so he will use the Mayor to strike upon the whole band appropriation when the estimates are under consideration by the Board of Control.

Handed over to the C. P. R.

To Aid Hubbard, the connection thrust upon Council on Monday with respect to the Hudson Bay Railway Committee, assisting the James Bay Railway to get a subsidy, means what is tantamount to a sell-out to the C. P. R.

"The \$5000 as I understand it," he said, "was voted to the committee by the City Council to enable them to secure a charter for a road or, better perhaps, to force the construction of a road whose freight rates would be controlled. I have no doubt but the James Bay Railway Company will ultimately be swallowed up by the C. P. R. and then they can grind the farmers out north, the very thing we were striving to avert."

LINSEED OIL MILL IN PROSPECT

Which Will Be Another Important Addition to the City's Industries—General News.

Hamilton, May 31.—(Special)—The Canadian Cannery and Packing Association is in session at the Waldorf Hotel to-day, the following members being present: G. B. Bouter, L. A. Wright and D. McAuley, P. B. Miller, Toronto; Messrs. Dolan, Fenlon and Schell, St. Catharines; Hugh MacIntosh, Chatham; Lightbound, Toronto, and W. P. Innes, Simcoe. W. A. Ferguson of Delhi, president of the association, is presiding over the gathering. The association decided to increase prices 10 per cent. this season, owing to the advance in the cost of tin and solder.

New Industry for Hamilton.

A linen mill will be started here shortly with a capital of \$200,000. The mill will have a capacity of 300,000 bushels of seed a year, equal to about 700 carloads. The oil will be sold for home consumption and the oil cakes exported to Europe. All the seed of old stock in Hamilton will also be manufactured. Options have been secured on large premises for the business if required. The concern will give employment to about 60 men, and the mill will be put in operation in the fall. It will have to switch runs into the premises.

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
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Change of Venue.

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
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
