The Parks and Recreation Committee of the City Council has passed a resolution recommending that leave be granted to place the monument at the northeast corner of the Allan Gardens, and yesterday J. L. Morrison, chairman of the committee, returned a notification to that effect. If the site offered by the city is selected, the Mayor will probably be asked to turn the first sod.

Prentice had quarrelled with a neighboring farmer's son over a rabbit, which Prentice said belonged to him. PROTECTION IN ENGLAND. Rumor That Budget Will Put Tax on Flour and Wheat.

London, April 11.—In spite of today's announcement that Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, is progressing so well that it is certain he will be able to introduce the budget on Monday next, there are those who believe that another postponement is likely to occur. It is especially said that the imposition of the tax on flour and wheat, a more diplomatic than organic. Those who are opposed to the tax, and who are in the position of the trade of the West Indies, went away with a strong impression that the government, even at this late date, had not definitely decided how to raise the sum represented by the enormous deficit. Nevertheless, the counties' rumors regarding the budget provisions continue to circulate. The Associated Press has good reason for believing that a tax will be imposed on flour, while it is possible that some sort of duty will be placed on wheat. The oil trade anticipates a duty on petroleum, but this is merely an intelligent surmise, as the government is constantly guarded with jealousy, in order to avoid the loss of revenue which occurred owing to business interests taking advantage of the premature leakage of the last budget's proposals.

ASSERT CANADA'S RIGHTS. Parliamentary Committee Will Discuss Copyright on Tuesday.

The Parliamentary Committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association held a meeting yesterday afternoon, at which the principal topic discussed was the copyright question. W. J. Gage was present and pointed out what he thought was the injustice of the present law. A special meeting of the committee will be held next Tuesday night to consider the following resolution:

"That, in the opinion of this committee, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association should place itself on record as being favorable to Canada asserting her rights to legislate regarding copyright, and that such legislation should require all books copyrighted in Canada to be manufactured in the Dominion.

All interested in the question are invited to attend the meeting.

RIOTERS ATTACK GENDARMES. Soldiers Use Their Revolvers, But Forced to Retreat.

Brussels, April 11.—Sharp fighting occurred this morning at Brucquegnies (near Charleroi). Several thousand strikers attacked and stoned a body of gendarmes, who retaliated by firing their revolvers. A sharp fusillade followed, and the gendarmes were compelled to retreat. A squadron of mounted police galloped up and charged and dispersed the mob.

The Belgian government has decided to prosecute martial law on Monday, unless order is previously restored.

To the Indian Ocean. St. Petersburg, April 11.—The Exchange Gazette says it thinks the recent loans to Persia ought to lead to the formation of a Russian company for railway construction in Persia. Russia ought in this way to obtain a share in the Indian Ocean in the same manner as by the Manchurian Railway she has obtained access to the Pacific.
