

BISHOP IS GLIB IN HOLD-UP CASE

Halted By Bandit in Alaska He
Persuaded Desperado
of Error.

Seattle, Nov. 15.—One time in the criminal career of Karl Hendrickson, who passed through this city a few days ago en route for McNeill's Island, the better man in him prevailed and he refrained from robbing a man that he held up. It was Bishop Rowe, of Alaska, who persuaded the feckless man to forgo the practice of his chosen profession when the two met on a lonely trail in a far-away section of Alaska in the dead of winter some years ago, according to a story that has been brought from the northland by travelers just returned.

In the course of his visits to the various missions in Alaska Bishop Rowe often found it necessary to undertake long journeys to isolated sections. The season of the year was no hindrance to the ecclesiastic, and he penetrated unknown regions fearlessly in the prosecution of his charitable work without ever a thought of danger.

On one of these trips several years ago the bishop had "bucked snow" on an almost forsaken trail for a whole day without meeting a soul. Toward evening he saw a speck come up over the horizon slowly. It grew larger and the missionary quickly realized that it was a man. He was glad of it and had a vision of a friendly chat and social camp for the night, being too far away from any roadhouse to be able to reach it that day. As the man approached there was nothing unusual about his appearance to excite suspicion in the bishop, for the winter fogs of all travelers in the far north are much alike.

Though the occasional presence of highwaymen on the trail was generally known, the churchman never gave the matter a passing thought and he walked straight up to the stranger prepared to give him welcome.

"Hands up!" was the unexpected salutation, and the bishop obeyed instinctively as the wayfarer covered him with a gun. Then came the other demand to deliver whatever worldly property of value he might possess. Although the predicament would have been a serious one for the average person, Bishop Rowe took a lighter view of it.

"You would not hold up a bishop, would you?" he asked, and the man whose features were now clearly visible, dropped the gun.

"You're not bluffing, are you?" he said as he surveyed his victim-to-be from head to foot.

Bishop Rowe realized that he had none of the distinguishing marks by which men of the cloth can be recognized usually. To make certain as to his identity, the highwayman wanted to know of what church he was a bishop.

"The Episcopal Church," Bishop Rowe answered with assurance.

"Why, I belong to that church myself. As we're brothers, I guess I'll have to let it pass," and with that the highwayman prepared to resume his journey.

During the brief parley that followed he made himself known as Karl Hendrickson, the man who had terrorized many lone travelers in Alaska, and to whom many depredations are charged. The men parted, each going his way, the bishop to do good and the hold-up to rob. Some time ago Hendrickson was sentenced by the court at Fairbanks to a long term in the penitentiary. On the way down the Yukon he saw his way to liberty, but was recaptured and finally landed in Seattle. He is now at McNeill Island to serve his time.

WANT COAL PUT ON FREE LIST

American Concern Say Would
Start Big Plant at
Canadian Soo.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Nov. 15.—Much interest is taken in the upper peninsula of Michigan and in the northern districts of Ontario in the coming action of the Canadian Parliament relative to the tariff on coal. If the tariff is removed at the request of the Lake Superior Corporation a large coking industry will be located on the Ontario side of the river, but if the tariff stands unchanged the plant will be built on the Michigan side. The output is to be used by the Algoma Steel Company, a subsidiary corporation of the Lake Superior Corporation.

The corporation has been quietly working for several months with a view to having coal placed on the free list, as it is considered necessary to establish the company's own coke ovens near the plant. The purchase of coke in the lower lake region has not been satisfactory, as it has deteriorated in value because of frequent handling in shipping. It is claimed by the company that a large saving in the manufacture of steel rails will be effected when the ovens are erected and in operation. It will be even more profitable to manufacture coke on the Michigan side if the tariff on coal is untouchable. With such a plant in connection with its big steel industry the corporation would also be in better shape to meet competition should the steel trust ever decide to enter Canada.

About two years ago it was rumored that the trust was desirous of securing a foothold on Canadian soil. At that time representatives of the organization came here and looked over the Algoma region, which had transpired in the way of negotiations, if anything, has never been learned. Within the past few weeks persons supposed to represent the trust have quietly secured claims aggregating 800 acres of iron ore lands in Algoma district. They came to the Michigan Soo and secured a tug with which they went up the Lake Superior mission, and it was only after the deal had been completed that they were after lands. The crew of the tug was even in ignorance of the purpose of the trip.

The Algoma Steel Company and the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, of Sydney, both of Canada, at present cannot keep abreast of orders. The Canadian roads are forced to buy some of the rails in the United States. Within the next six weeks the Algoma Steel Company will complete its new open hearth furnaces, which will increase its output and make it possible for the concern to enter the structural steel field within the near future.

PLEADS GUILTY

Murderer on Trial Unexpectedly Declares He Is Guilty.

Pottsville, Pa., Nov. 15.—"Guilty" was the plea which Dominick Lopte made when arraigned in court for the murder of aged Mrs. Bridget Haley, in New Castle last July. The sight of a man with uplifted hand declaring himself guilty of a crime which would consign him to the gallows caused a tremendous sensation in the courtroom. The response of Lopte came at the end of the stereotyped question asked of persons accused of murder. "What say you, guilty or not guilty?" For Lopte's defense and W. J. Whitehouse, who had been engaged to defend him, rushed to the side of the prisoner and told him to say, "Not guilty." But Lopte insisted upon declaring, with his hand still uplifted, that he was guilty. He said he took a part in the crime and should be punished for it.

Notwithstanding Lopte's plea, Judge Marr ordered that a plea of not guilty should be recorded as having been made by the prisoner, as pleas of guilty in the first degree are not accepted. The drawing of a jury to try the case then began.

Lopte, after a dispute with Mrs. Haley's son, shot down Mrs. Haley in her own doorway. There were two men concerned, the defendant and a fellow-countryman named Michael Salerno, but the latter eluded the posse which captured Lopte and made his way to Italy. He was recently arrested, and an effort is now being made to have him extradited to this country for trial, but the hopes of the county officials along these lines are not strong.

BOUND TO GET FISH

Gloucester People Go to Expense of Hiring British Boats.

Gloucester, Mass., Nov. 15.—That the Gloucester fishermen will exhaust every possible means of securing herring from the waters off the coast of Newfoundland, despite the restrictions which the Colonial Government desires to impose, became more evident than ever yesterday, when the first British schooner to reach Gloucester from the Newfoundland fishing grounds this year came into the harbor. This vessel was the B. G. Anderson, owned by Thomas Zink, of Lunenburg, N. S., commanded by Capt. Walsh, a native of Nova Scotia, manned by a Nova Scotia crew and under charter to Lauchlin McLean, of Wood Island, Bay of Islands, Nfld.

She brought a fare of thirteen hundred barrels of salt herring. Capt. Walsh paid the regular import duty on his cargo and then sold the entire fare to a local company. It is not yet known here whether the Gloucester fish companies will find this method sufficiently profitable to induce them to make permanent arrangements with British vessel owners to engage in the industry.

BURROWS AGAINST TARIFF REVISION

Doesn't Believe Americans Are
Clamoring for It, Says
Washington Star.

Washington, Nov. 15.—The Washington Star has the following to say tonight on the tariff situation: "I do not construe the result of the elections as a verdict in favor of tariff revision," said Senator Burrows, of Michigan, who came to town today. "I do not believe that country is clamoring for revision. However, if it must come, it ought to come at a special session of Congress and not be postponed until the eve of the presidential election."

"Senator Burrows has a vivid recollection of the danger of tackling the tariff question just before a presidential election. He was second in rank on the ways and means committee of the House when the McKinley tariff bill was passed within a month of election and the Democratic landslide swept the Republicans out of power root and branch and put Grover Cleveland in the White House for the second term."

"Senator Burrows in his foregoing statement reflects the views of the 'stand-patters' in Congress. They will desperately oppose all revision talk, and man for man they stubbornly insist that the late elections wrote no warning upon the wall. But if the worst comes of the worst they will demand an extra session."

"It is known that the present Administration in the House is very fearful of not being able to organize the next House in event of a special session on the present satisfactory 'stand-pat' basis. The Canons, Paynes and Dalzels realize that they are facing a difficult situation in the reduction of their big majority and the consequent infusion of new and radical blood in the House membership."

"The tariff revisionists form a militant faction in the House and their number will be materially reinforced in the sixtieth Congress. They are doggedly determined to have a readjustment of the Dingley schedules even if we have to ride down our organization, as one of them put it."

"The 'stand-patters' will try at the coming session of Congress to divert attention from the tariff as much as possible and to that end will join with a glad cry in the talk over the President's new schemes of wealth and corporation tax. They see a new toy with which to interest the public and will keep the ball rolling when the President kicks off."

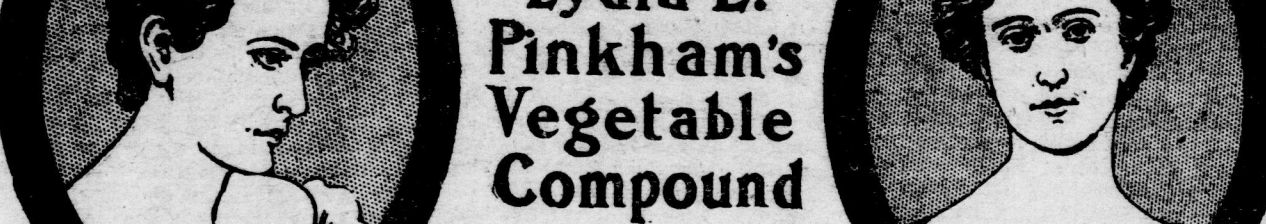

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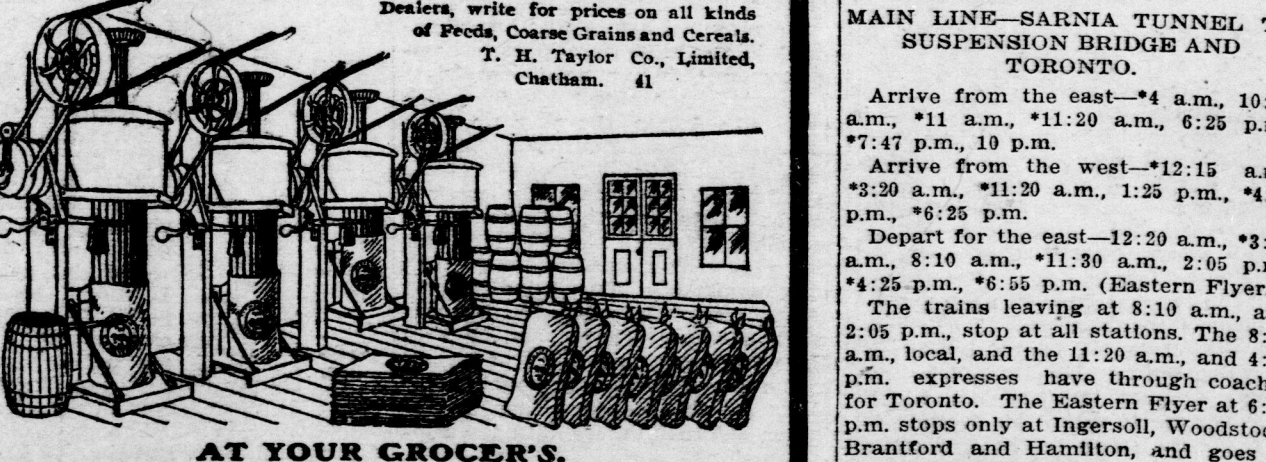
