Dr. W. H. Woods, D. D. G. M. of the London district, congratulated the lodge on its anniversary, and declared that Dominion Lodge would soon again take its place as the banner lodge in Oddfellowship. He was anxious for the success of the order, and desired that the membership should increase greatly during the coming year. The members of the order in the London district were enthusiastic, and were working for the success of the I. O. O. F.

The gathering was brought to a close at midnight by singing the National Anthem.
