

Barbers Will Cut Prices In New York City

New Shops Will Be Opened in
Metropolis.

New York, May 28.—Prices of shaves and hair-cuts in New York will soon be cut to 15 and 25 cents respectively, according to Leon Worthal, general organizer of the International Barbers' Union. The cut rates will be made in new barber shops, which, he said today, will be opened by the Barbers' Union or individual union members.

Barbers in the new places, he said, will receive the union wage scale of \$20 a week, with 50 per cent of all earnings above receipts of \$42 a week. Tipping will not be barred. Thirty-five cents will be the price also for a massage, shampoo, singe or manure.

MRS. GOODERHAM WILL REMAIN WITH I. O. D. E. MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

Withdraws Resignation After Some Consideration.

Calgary, May 28.—Mrs. A. E. Gooderham of Toronto has withdrawn her resignation as a life member of the I. O. D. E. National Chapter. This was announced at the session of the convention yesterday in response to a resolution asking that she reconsider her withdrawal.

The undercurrent of bitterness over the Gooderham-Kingsmill affair is still noticeable in the convention, despite every effort to eradicate it, and on nearly every question which comes up the convention instantly splits into factional lines. It has required great tact on the part of Mrs. Bruce to prevent open warfare on several occasions. This was evidenced in the incident yesterday, when Mrs. George Smith submitted her educational committee report. One of the delegates moved a vote of appreciation to Mrs. Smith as originator of the war against the I. O. D. E. of Toronto immediately took exception to this, stating that the credit should go to the Lady Kingsmill Chapter, the Laurentian of Ottawa. For a moment another break seemed imminent, but it was smoothed over.

SEARCH FOR RUM BURIED 150 YEARS AGO COMMENCED

The Pas, Man., May 27.—Ten cases of rum which an Indian tradition says were buried at Cumberland House, a century and a half ago, were being searched for today by a party of prospectors.

The story, in which the searchers place full credence, is that the rum was brought into the north by a French trading party, which was stopped at Cumberland House and turned back by the Hudson Bay people after they had hidden the liquor, which was intended for the Indian trade.

The alleged cache is believed to include merchandise, muskets and ammunition, but the investigators believe that time has not been as good to these articles as it has been to the rum, which is the object of the search.

DETROIT ASKS SUPPORT OF NEW YORK IN BIG WATERWAY SCHEME

New York, May 28.—In a letter to the New York Sun and Herald published this morning, R. J. MacLean, vice-chairman of the inland waterways committee of the Detroit Board of Commerce, makes a plea for New York support for the proposed St. Lawrence deep waterway.

"It is begging to be understood," writes Mr. MacLean, "that the opposition from New York is limited to those directly interested in the New York State Barge Canal, who are not opposed to the barge canal; they want to use it whenever it is to their advantage. But it is absolutely necessary that these states have direct connection with the markets of the world through a deep waterway that will transform the present lake ports into ocean ports. This will increase the business of the northwestern states beyond imagination and will result in greatly increased business for New York and other ports of the country."

"The proposition will go through, and certainly the northwestern states will prefer to see it go through with the co-operation of New York."

INQUEST ORDERED

"Hamburgher Joe" Porter is Held by
Dunnville Authorities.

Dunnville, May 28.—(By the Canadian Press).—An inquest will be opened on Monday next on the remains of L. D. "Hamburgher Joe" Porter, alias Appert, a disgruntled concessionaire, with whom he was having a dispute over money matters. Porter, who was shot and dangerously wounded when he drew his revolver on the approach of Town Constable Winslow and two circus hands to arrest him, is under close guard in hospital, where it is stated this morning he will probably recover.

FOREST FIRES ARE MENACING SECTIONS IN THE MARITIME

Chester, N. S., May 28.—The district about East Point, a few miles from here, is very seriously menaced by forest fires. A very bad fire started at Goat Lake on Wednesday, but is now under control. This fire burned over some 100 acres. Yesterday, after a freight train of the Halifax and Southwestern had passed, a new fire broke out in the green woods about a mile from the scene of Wednesday. The fire is still burning, and a serious forest fire is burning near Alton.

TIMBER IS SEIZED.
Toronto, May 28.—As a result of evidence given before the royal commission regarding timber limits, the crown timber agent at Port Arthur has made a seizure of many logs there, and they will be held pending investigation as to the limits from which they have been obtained.

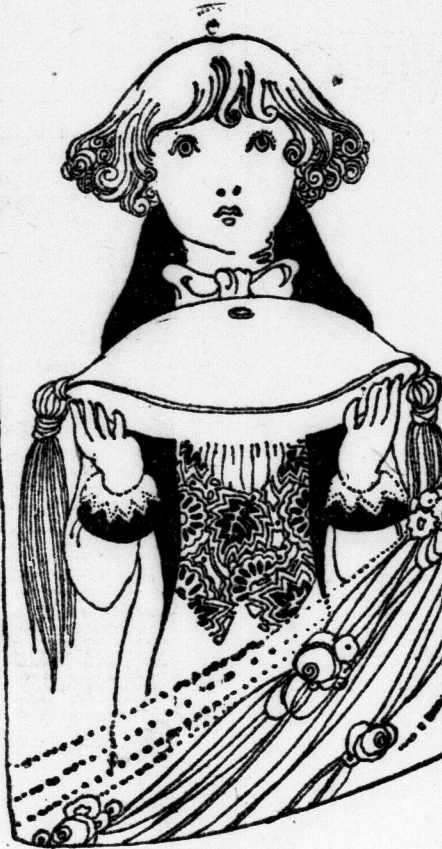

Brockville, May 28.—Pulling out from the Canadian Pacific dock, after making minor repairs to her engine, the steamer India, of the Montreal Transportation Company, ran on a shoal at the end of Blackhouse Island. She was able to work off without assistance, but
