SARNIA'S GRATUITY FOR WAR VETERANS TO BE AWARDED SOON

Building Permits Issued To
July 31 Valued At
\$199,330.

SARNIA, Aug. 3.—Mayor William
Nisbit tonight announced that the civic
gratuity given by the citizens of Sarnia
to the men who enlisted in this city,
would soon be made as the results of
the lists now being officially closed.

The health report for the past week

has been marred by three cases of

While the official statistics for build-
ing in July are not completed, it was
stated tonight that the numbers of
homes built during that month will
break all Imperial City building records.

A MARRIAGE RECORD.
July easily surpassed June as the
month of brides in this city, accord-
ing to the official vital statistics is-
sued today, which lists 29 marriages
for the month ended Saturday last, as
compared with but 17 of the previous
month. The mortality record was
larger, however, 18 deaths being record-
ed with only 16 in June. Twenty-six
births were listed last month, less
than in June when 31 were recorded.

During July Fire Chief Keyes issued
building permits for a value of \$38,400,
including one for a \$30,000 factory for
Elliott & Whitehall. On July 31 68
permits, with a value of \$199,330, have
been taken out, a decrease compared
with records of 1919.

BRITISH CLERGYMAN SCORES WOMEN'S DRESS

CARDIFF, Wales, Aug. 3.—Again a
British clergyman has put his foot down
against the prevailing fashions in
women's dress, and refused to give
communion to all women who kneel at
the altar rail in attire which he may
regard as immodest.

Father Joseph Partin, celebrating
high mass at St. Paul's Roman Catholic
Church here, issued the following warn-
ing to his congregation: "I hope," he
said, "that lady members of my parish
will not attempt to attire themselves in
some of the present day fashions. If
any immodest woman ap-
proaches the altar for Holy Communion
I shall refuse to allow her to partake
of the Sacrament, passing her by as if
she did not exist."

ROBERTSON PREDICTS BIG ADVANTAGE FOR WELLAND SHIP CANAL

Labor Minister Addresses the
Niagara Industrial Con-
gress At Welland.

WELLAND, Aug. 3.—This city tonight
was gay with flags and bunting in honor
of the visitors attending the Niagara
District Industrial Congress, and a ban-
quet was given under the auspices of
the ladies of the local churches.

Senator Gideon Robertson, minister
of labor, was the chief speaker at the
banquet. He extolled Welland as a
centre of industry, and spoke of the
great advantages to be gained by the
Canal is completed, and as well as Canada in
general, when the new Welland Ship
River Canals deepened. Hon. Mr. Rob-
ertson referring to speeches made earlier
