DEAD, OR WANDERERS? MYSTERY OF TWO MEN

Benjamin Dancy's Strange Disappearance From Aylmer Hotel Nine Years Ago.

On behalf of the A. O. U. W., the courts have been asked to declare whether or not Benjamin E. Dancy is legally dead.

Dancy while a guest at the Mansion House, Aylmer, in April, 1899, left word to be called for the 7 a.m. train. When a boy went to his room he had gone and has never since been heard of.

If alive he is 49 years of age. Five grown up sons are in the family, two occupying farms in Malahide Township and two in Elgin County, to which latter pair is left the \$2000 insurance. One is a doctor in Michigan. Their mother died in 1890 and according to the charge Ontario Government by the executor of the late Charles E. Fulford for \$13,000 succession duties.

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KUBELIK ENTRANCES CANADIAN CHARM

Large Audience at Massey Hall to Enjoy Unusually Fine Program.

Last night at Massey Hall an immense audience heard in marvelous quality every effect of which the violin is possible, until the instrument seemed "a weird, wild thing; bewitched from end to end." And Jan Kubelik stood forth as a wizard more potent than any other violinist of the present day.

For the effects themselves there was everything to delight and astonish—ravishing tone, nuances of all kinds and all the special devices, such as his incomparable harmonic trills in saltato.

But what was most remarkable was the dexterous fingers of Kubelik and the strings which lay responsive above the bridge and finger board of his sweet Stradivarius. There was nothing in the music itself that could touch and play upon the heart-strings of humanity; there was nothing in the playing and exalted lovefulness for the spiritual being of the men and women who heard and were astonished, who listened and marveled, but were not surprised.

For technique is not an end in themselves; they are a means of touching the heart and imagination with "fervors of the beyond." Yet Kubelik must be acknowledged the present-day King of the Violin, and as great as Paganini in his day.

What a marvelous performance Kubelik gave us is beyond imagining and must have been heard to be conceived. But there is no doubt that he is as Eric Mackay said of Sarasate in his day: "A student of the future."

PLANS ALL TOO HIGH.

When Mr. Hyslop Wanted One Kind and Architect Would Elaborate. E. J. Lennox is suing Hyslop Bros. in the assizes for \$3381 for preparing plans for the Shuter-street garage.

When tenders were called, they totaled \$117,000, but Mr. Lennox cut them to \$85,000, and then suggested a new set of plans, which, when completed, provided for an outlay of \$77,000. Arrangements for a loan, assisted by Mr. Lennox, fell thru and afterwards plans for a \$50,000 building were drawn after Mr. Hyslop had asked for one at \$30,000. Then the matter dropped.
