A student of Marmontel of Paris, she has become under his tuition as brilliant in technical accomplishments as her sister artist, Mme. Samaroff; and I am sure her bright French-Canadian as wonderful a planiste as any of her sex have become. In the Saint Saens "Valse Caprice" s ie was really as ounding in her command over chords, arppeggios, grand scales, octaves and in pedalling.
