KUBELIK ENTRANCES

CANADIAN LINE CHARM

Large Audience at Massey Hall to

Enjoy Unusually Fine

Program.

Last night at Massey Hall an im-

mense audience heard in marvelous

quality every effect of which the violin

is possible, until the instrument seemed

a weird, wild thing; bewitched from

end to end. And Jan Kubelik stood

forth as a wizard more potent than

even Wieniawski, Sarasate, Caesar

Thomson or Ysaye, and as the rightful

heir to all the wonderful ingenuities

and art of Paganini, who first made

violin to sob or sigh, and to sing and

trill as if its tones came from the

throats of a myriad choir of birds.

For the effects themselves there was

everything to delight and astonish—

ravishing tones, nuances of all kinds

and all the special devices, such as in-

comparable tremolos, tricks in saltato

and pizzicato. But alas! it was all in

the dexterous fingers of Kubelik and

the strings which lay responsive above

the bridge and finger board of his sweet

Stradivarius. There was nothing in

the music itself that could touch

and play upon the heart-strings of hu-

manity; there was something in the

being of the man and woman who

heard and were astonished, who listen-

ed and marveled, but were not re-

joiced. For technique is not an end

in itself; they are a means of touch-

ing the heart and imagination with

the fervors of the beyond. Yet Kubelik

must be acknowledged the present-day

King of the Violin, and as great as Pa-

ganini in his day.

What a marvelous performance Ku-

belik gave us is beyond imagining and

must have been heard to be conceived.

But there is no doubt that he is as Eric

Mackay said of Sarasate in his day:

I am sure her bright French-Canadian

temperament will enable her soon to be

as wonderful a pianist as any of her

sex have been, and a native of Quebec.

"Valse Caprice" he was really as out-

ing in her command over chords, ar-

peggios, grand scales, octaves and in

pedalling. She deserves all the com-

pliments she has received in other

countries; and she is a credit to her

native land, Canada. —J. D. LOGAN.
