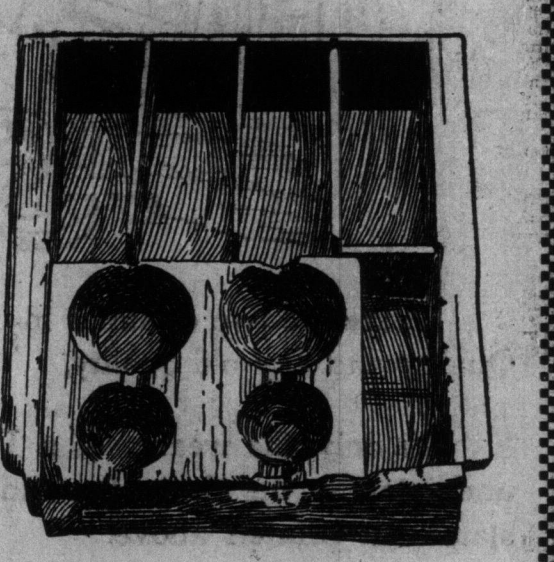
Accompanied by His Mother, Mrs. Cornwallis West, he Delivers Six Speeches in Manchester on Saturday.

Four of them will be decided during the coming week. By far the most interesting will be held to return a member from the northwest division of Manchester, where the Conservatives have a strong hold. It is in this seat that Mr. Churchill, who is seeking re-election on his elevation to the Presidency of the Board of Trade, will be a keen competitor. WASHINGTON, April 19.—From a number of conferences which Chairman Cullom of the senate committee on foreign relations has had recently with President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Root, it is now probable that before the adjournment of the present session of congress, blanket authority will be voted to the president to proceed against Venezuela, in such manner as subsequent events may require to uphold the dignity of the United States and protect the interests of American citizens.

Prior to his going to Chicago was a consul at Vancouver for several years and would therefore be in touch with a considerable extent with conditions in the Dominion, particularly the Japanese immigration problem. He had also held a consulate at Hongkong, China.

His last work was a design for a certificate of merit of the Quebec Battleship's Fund.

WRECK OF UNKNOWN VESSEL DRIFTING ASHORE.

VANCOUVER, B.C., April 18.—Further evidence is coming to hand of a wreck on the west coast of Vancouver Island, the name of the lumber-craft has not yet been ascertained. The news was first brought by a half-breed runner to Port Carmanah and as the craft lay between there and Port Renfrew, where the wreckage is coming ashore, is very rough, details are difficult to secure.

Will Recommend Abattoir.

QUEBEC, April 18.—(Special.)—A short time ago a special committee of the city council was appointed to investigate the conditions of the city's slaughter houses and report on the advisability of establishing a municipally-owned abattoir. It is learned that Tuesday night's meeting of the city council the committee will recommend that the establishment of a municipal abattoir, at which all meat offered for sale in the city would be slaughtered, would be in the interests of the public health. The abattoir, if established, will be under the control of the board of public health, and a competent inspector will be placed in charge.

Wrecked on 90-Foot Embankment.

PERRY, N.Y., April 18.—A light engine running at full speed in a heavy fog met the Perry accommodation on the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh in a head-on collision at Rockledge, eight miles from here last night. Michael Sallou of Perry, fireman on the passenger engine, was crushed and scalded, and may die. He was rushed to Rochester on a relief train. The light engine was trying to make a sliding not more than 60 rods from the scene of the wreck. The wreck occurred on a ledge overlooking a 90 foot embankment.
