ASSIZE COURT OPENS

VERDICT FOR \$1000

Street Railway Case Decided—Justice Mulock's Reference to Kirkpatrick Case.

HAMILTON, May 18.—(Special.)—The assizes were opened this afternoon by Chief Justice Sir William Mulock. The action of Rogers v. Hamilton Street Railway Company was finished. The plaintiff, Alfred Rogers, was injured in a collision between a street car and a freight train at King-street and Ferguson-avenue on Nov. 12, and sued for \$2000. He gets \$1000 and costs. To the grand jury the chief justice stated that they would have two criminal cases, the murder charge against Giuseppe and Bruno Greco, and the charge of manslaughter against William Kirkpatrick. His lordship said that Kirkpatrick and Joseph Cummings, the dead boy, were indulging in a boyish prank. In a scuffle Kirkpatrick is alleged to have concealed a knife, and he admitted it had not been shown that he deliberately cut him, and it was not shown that there was any malice on his part. He also referred to the frequency with which boyish pranks in factories led to serious trouble, and thought there should be some means by which a more strict supervision should be exercised. Sir William scored the county council for not having built a house of refuge, and said it was a shame that old people should be sent to jail when they were only poor. In referring to aliens carrying concealed weapons, he suggested that a law be passed to prevent this, and to provide for the searching of suspects.

New Presbyterian Church.

A meeting of the Southeast Presbyterians, who are desirous of erecting a new church in their section, was held to-night in the Victoria Curling Club. The name St. Giles Church was unanimously chosen for the proposed church. J. B. Graham, A. M. Cunningham and A. M. McKenzie were appointed a committee to appear before the presbytery at its meeting in Chippewa on Thursday, and apply for recognition. The Presbyterian Church Extension Union is prepared to pay the interest on a mortgage of \$2000 estimated at \$600 a year for five years, but as the proposition was not entirely satisfactory the representatives will request a better arrangement.

The North End Improvement Society held a meeting to-night and decided to hold another meeting on Monday for the purpose of forming plans for the erection of a large hall in the north end. It is understood that the action of Walter Howell against the Street Railway Company for \$10,000 for injuries as the result of a collision between a street car and a freight train, was settled for \$1000.

OBITUARY

QUEBEC, May 18.— Death came peacefully at noon to-day to Sir Louis N. Casault. Sir Louis was born at St. Thomas in 1823. He was professor of commercial and maritime law in Laval University from 1858 to 1891, and was created V. C. by Viceroy Lord Dufferin in 1867. While at the bar he was counsel for the Province of Quebec in the arbitration for the division and adjustment of the debts of the late provinces of upper and lower Canada and afterwards appointed one of the three arbitrators charged with the settlement of accounts between the Dominion and provinces. He sat for Montmagny in the Canadian assembly for the riding of Bellechasse in the commons from 1867 until elevated to the bench of the superior court of Quebec in 1870. He received the honor of knighthood in 1874, and became chief justice of the superior court the same year.

Frank E. Winfield, secretary-treasurer of Young-Winfield, Limited, Hamilton, died at his father's residence, 31 Shannon-street, on Sunday, a victim of meningitis. Mr. Winfield was 30 years of age and had represented the Manufacturers' Life Insurance Company in Kingston, Jamaica, until shortly before the earthquake, and also at Calgary. He was a member of St. Paul's and Old Orchard Lawn Tennis Club, and Old Orchard Club.

James Gilmour, ex-M.P. for East Middlesex, and ex-county warden, aged 78 years.
