NURDERER CAPTURED

to Raise the Ax and Slay,

BROCKVILLE, April 24,-(Special.) BROCKVILLE, April 24.—(Special.)—Contrary to general expectation, Albert Holmes, the slayer of Nathan Bolton, the Edwardsburg farmer, was taken alive on Saturday near the scene of the crime. His arrest was effected by G.T.R. section men who found the accused towards evening sitting on a pile of ties beside the track. Shortly before, the man came out of his hiding place, apparently relieved at being discovered and quietrelieved at being discovered and quiet-ly submitted to arrest. He was de-livered over to the authorities at Cardinal and arrangements promptly made for holding a preliminary trial. The evidence adduced was along the line of that given at the inquest on Friday, the leading witness being Ethel Holmes, daughter of the prison-er, who first discovered the crime and gave the alarm. She was sitting alone in the kitchen adjoining the shed where Holmes and Bolton were cutting up a pig. There was no altercation as far as she could hear, but groans attracted her attention, and on one ping the door and locking interest. groans attracted her attention, and on opening the door and looking into the shed she made the gruesome discovery of Bolton in the throes of death lying on the floor with his skull crushed in by two blows from an ax, which was covered with blood and hair. Her father was not to be seen, having passed out into the yard en route to the woods.

Magistrate Clark made out the committal for a charge of murder, and a constable brought Holmes to the Brockville County jail to await his

Holmes is a mental and physical wreck. In fact he is so weak that he has been unable to leave his bed since coming to the jail and is under the care of a physician with a constant guard to avoid any attempt at suicide. Tho very reticent he states that after entering the swamp, on the edge of which he conversed with a boy namcommunication from the Employers' Association of Waterloo County, which includes a majority of the manufacturers of Waterloo and Berlin.
