GUILTY, BUTNOT GUILTY.

Jury's Peculiar Verdict in the Case Against Jos. Gurofsky.

"We find the prisoner guilty, but not guilty of theft," was the verdict rendered by the jury in the general sessions yesterday in the case of Joseph Gurofsky, manager of "the ward" branch of the Crown Bank, who was charged with the theft of \$150 from Morris Goldstein, the proceeds of a note deposited in the bank. One jurymen questioned by the judge, said he thought the money had been improperly retained, but did not consider it theft. The case will be appealed and a stated case will be made at once.

At the time of the offence, Goldstein was debtor to the Crown Bank for \$235. On Oct. 17 he asked a man named Kling to cash his note for \$150. Kling gave Goldstein a cheque for \$134, which the latter endorsed and presented to Gurofsky. The next day Goldstein was told that the bank had refused the cheque.

Gurofsky, in the box, said that he took the cheque from Goldstein, with no representations that the cheque would be cashed. He made out a deposit slip for the amount to Goldstein's credit, where it was at present. The solicitor of the bank had told him he was within his rights.

"Gentlemen," he said, "I did this for the bank, and I did not get a cent for myself."

Goldstein had given a chattel mortgage to a brother-in-law, and Gurofsky thought the advance from the bank was thus imperilled.

In his charge, Judge Winchester said that in this case Gurofsky was acting for the bank, but this attitude did not deliver him from the personal charge of theft, as the bank acted thru its officers, and the officers were responsible.

S.O.T. BENEFIT SYSTEM.

Important Decision Made at 59th Annual Meeting of Order.

At the fifty-ninth annual meeting of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance in Ontario, just concluded at Port Perry, it was decided to establish a sick and funeral benefit system. A benefit board composed of the grand division officers and three members elected annually to prepare the bylaws will be incorporated under the Insurance Act of Ontario. The bylaws provided for the largest increase in the division since the last meeting. The system adopted and the bylaws provided have already been accepted by the inspectors of insurance.

An increase in the number of divisions and a large representation of members indicate a strong order. This year new divisions have been established during the year, and a district division has been organized on Manitoulin Island.

Orilla division won the silver trophy for East Simcoe district by returning the largest increase during the year. Kettley is the largest division in the order, with 200 members.

HAMILTON ASKS RIGHT TO LOCATE RADIAL LINES

Bonds for \$75,000 Sold Below 90—City Will Ask for Better Insurance Rates.

HAMILTON, Dec. 5.—(Special.)—The finance committee this afternoon instructed City Solicitor Waddell to make efforts to secure the insertion of a clause in the radial bill which will come before the house of commons at its present sitting, giving the city council the right to locate the company's lines in Hamilton. Grundy & Co.'s offer to purchase \$75,000 bonds at 88.80 was accepted. Mayor Stewart was authorized to appoint a committee to convince the underwriters of Hamilton, after having spent large sums of money in improving its waterworks system and fire department, was entitled to better fire insurance rates. M. J. O'Reilly appeared for the separate school board, and got the aidment to agree to pay the whole of the board's claim for \$5000.

The internal management committee of the board of education this evening appointed Emma J. Deyman, a trained nurse, at \$250 for six months, to inspect the children at the public schools.

The trustees declined to start night classes for foreigners, but will notify the ministerial association that it can have the old customs house, on Stuart street, with furniture, if the ministers will provide the teachers. A savings bank system will be started on Jan. 1, in connection with the public schools, and manual training classes will be established in the Wentworth and Caroline-street schools. A deputation to inspect manual training schools will leave next Monday evening for Rochester, representing the separate school board will be asked to accompany the deputation.

The resignation of Miss Kennedy, a teacher, was accepted. The schools will not open for the new year until Jan. 6.

C. E. McCullough gave an address to the Knox Church Young Men's Union this evening, in which he stated that he conceived the idea and started the first Canadian Club.

Thomas Lewis, 168 North West-avenue, died this evening, at the age of 88 years. He had been employed for 40 years by the Doyal distillery.

Conservative Convention.

The Conservatives will hold their convention a week from Saturday night, when it is expected that addresses will be delivered by either R. L. Borden or some of the leaders of the party.

The city council has an overdraft now of \$37,000, but it is said that this will be reduced to about \$30,000 by increased receipts.

This morning at 130 Willie Stokes, Charlton-avenue, and Fred Turnbull, Toronto, were caught in J. H. Hornung's grocery store on John-street, and at 9 o'clock this morning they had gathered up a lot of stuff ready to carry away, and fledged to be asleep in the school.

Rev. Dr. Nelson announced to-day that he had accepted the call to the Park-avenue Church, Minneapolis, and has a membership of 650, and five buildings, free of debt. A lady assistant to the pastor is expected. It is understood that the salary offered is \$4000 a year, with an increase of \$1000. He will take charge about Jan. 1.

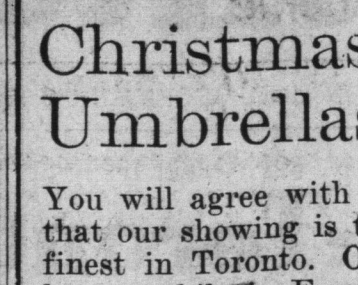
