FORESTERS HONOR BROTHER DEPARTED

Five Hundred Mourners Look Their Last on Supreme Secretary.

Thankful for the contribution he had made to humanity by his faithful services and devotion to duty." The above words are taken from part of the eloquent tribute spoken last night by Rev. Dr. MacGillivray, supreme chaplain to the Independent Order of Foresters, at a memorial service to the late Fred J. Darch, late supreme secretary to the order, who died suddenly on Friday morning from heart failure.

The memorial service was held in the Bonar Presbyterian Church, and quite five hundred sympathizing friends of the deceased were present in the church. The casket, which had upon it two magnificent wreaths, was placed at the foot of the chancel, and that portion showing the face of the deceased opened so that all who wished to pass by the casket and take one last look at this dead friend could do so. Mrs. Darch, with her daughter and son, were present at the service, which was fully choral. The two hymns, "A Day's March Nearer Home" and "Now the Laborer's Task Is O'er," were rendered, whilst Dr. Donald MacGregor sang in good voice "Crossing the Bar," to organ accompaniment.

Dr. MacGillivray in referring to the suddenness of Mr. Darch's end said going out so quickly might be a mercy—some people would choose such a way for this end. There was no torturing pain, heart-rending partings, or years of inactivity to endure in such a death, only one clear, decisive cut out of the darkness to the fuller life

"The deceased," said Dr. MacGillivray, "made a success of everything he undertook. His name in fraternal circles was a household word, and his memory would be long cherished, for he brought gladness and hope to not a few hearts. To the Foresters," said the doctor, "he was best known by the services he rendered to the order, and they had conferred upon him the highest order they had to give, as they recognized he possessed conspicuous ability. He served 200,000 of his fellowmen, and never during the whole period he held office was one complaint or grumble made against him


