The CCekoo.—In our British Islands, the cuckoo is a migratory bird; that is to suy, it lives with us during a short time in the milder season of the year, and then wings its way to a more gential clime. It generally makes its appearance in England about the 21st of April—in the north somewhat later—and takes its leave early in July: a rather remarkable fact, as July is our warmest month. The explanation seems to be, that the cuckoo only visits our country for the purpose of breeding, and, when that business is accomplished, has no inclination to prolong its stay. This habit of the bird is the principal subject of allusion in the beautiful ode written in its honour—an ode seever delightful to peruse, that no apology need be made for repeating it here:—
