Antiquity of Horse Racing.—In the drawing-room of Leasow Castle, now the residence of Sir Edward (Cust) is, among other valuable pictures, a very ancient one of a horse-race that occurred here in the days of James I., including portraits of that monarch and his sons sharing in the sport, in which a buxom lady in a carriage driven by servants in the loyal livery, participates. The Wallace Leasow is probably the oldest gentleman's race-course in the kingdom, being noticed by Webb as existing in the early part of the seventeenth century. The races at the Rood-ey, at Chester, or at Smithfield and other places were comparatively the sports of a mere fair, and confer no rivalry to the aristocratic amusements of the Leasow course, which, in 1683, had rather an illustrious jockey, in the person of the famous Duke of Monmouth. Attended by a great retinue of gentry, the Duke was on a tour, conferring popularity in the western counties. At Chester he conferred the honour of knighthood on the daughter of the Mayor of London, in conformity with the duties attendant on that event, hearing that the principal families of the county had assembled at the Wallace Race, and he went thither and rode himself, which he won, and presented the prize to his infant god-daughter. In addition to the high antiquity and noble jockeyship of the Leasow Race-course, taking place in the month of May, the highest prize in the kingdom; for, in 1721, the great families of the west entered into an agreement to subscribe liberally for a week-stakes to be run for ten seasons on the Leasow course, in conformity with that arrangement the Grosvenors, Stanleys, Cholmondeleys, Egertons, Wynnes, and some others subscribed twenty guineas each annually, and undertook that they would have one horse brought to contest the stakes. The last of these races occurred in 1732; they were then removed to Newmarket, where, for many years, the "Wallace Stakes" formed a leading prize, but the Leasow continued to be a trial or training course until the middle of the last century. An old building in the village of Wallasey, said to have been the Grosvenor stable, yet existing, on the doors of which the horse's plates remained until the last three or four years.—*Mortimer's History of Wirral.*

Curious Calculation.—Some singular genius has perpetrated the following calculations, which are amusing— I have been married 32 years, during which time I have received the benefit of my wife three cups of coffee each day, two in the morning and one at night, making about 35,000 cups of half a pint each, or nearly 70 barrels of 30 gallons each, weighing 1720 lbs. I am not a very heavy weight. Yet from that period I have scarcely varied myself in weight 100 pounds. It will therefore be seen that I have drunk in coffee alone 216 times my own weight. I am not a very great eater, yet I presume I have consumed about eight ounces a day, which makes 2800 pounds, or about ten oxen. Of flour I have consumed in the 32 years, about 50 barrels. For 30 years of this time, up to 1811, I have drunk two wine glasses of brandy each day, making 900 quarts. The port wine, Madeira, whisky punch, &c., I am not able to count, but they are not large. In champagne I have been extremely moderate, as I find from my bills that I have paid for 33 bottles in the last 13 years, which is about one bottle a week, and this amount all consumed by me. When we take into the account the pease, asparagus, strawberries, cherries, apples, pears, peaches, &c., the amount consumed by an individual is most enormous. Now, my body has been renewed more than four times in 32 years; and taking it for granted that the water, of which I have drunk, acts as a diuretic, it may be said, yet all taken together, I conclude that I have consumed in 32 years, about the weight of 1100 men of 160 pounds each.—*Paris Paper.*
