A FEW FACTS ABOUT TUBERCULOSIS

Issued by The Department of Public Health, Nova Scotia

Tuberculosis, a preventable disease and in its early stage a curable disease, is the cause of nearly one-eighth of the deaths in Nova Scotia.

Because of the long period of invalidism which it ordinarily entails, it is accountable for much economic loss. It is not improbable that the yearly economic loss to the people of Nova Scotia, attributable to this disease, is nearly \$8,500,000.

A disease which is accountable for so many deaths, for so much suffering and sorrow and deprivation, and for such an enormous economic loss, should surely command our attention.

The disease is due to a germ which is easily disinfected, or destroyed by burning, the disease will not be communicated to others.

Infection by tuberculosis is the result of carelessness on the part of those who suffer from the disease. Many persons do not realize that they are tubercular, and quite innocently cause others to be infected. Remember that tuberculosis is much the commonest of diseases, and if you feel at all unwell it is possible that you may be developing this disease. Consult your doctor. Thus you may not only save your own life, but may prevent many others from becoming infected.

Three great factors in the cure of tuberculosis are sunlight, fresh air and good food. These are also the great factors in the prevention of the disease. The healthiest person cannot afford to neglect the sun and the air from his shop, office, workroom or dwelling.

If you are tubercular, do not take patent medicines. These nearly all contain alcohol, which may give a temporary sense of improvement, but which is nevertheless, usually, distinctly harmful to tubercular subjects.

A careful dealing with preventive measures in tuberculosis may be obtained free of charge by applying to the Provincial Health Officer, Halifax.

NOT ALLOWED TO HAVE LONG TROUSERS; BOY SUICIDES

Revere, Sept. 9.—Roger Bevilacqua, 17 son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph C. Bevilacqua of 109 Vane street, committed suicide by inhaling illuminating gas at his home. The boy was generally known by the name of Drinkwater, the English equivalent of his Italian name. Mr. Bevilacqua is a barber employed in Boston, and the family is highly respected in the neighborhood where general sympathy is expressed for the afflicted parents.

The boy's body was found by his sister who went to his room to call him. The police were notified and the pulmotor was used in an effort to revive the victim, but without success. Physicians said he had been dead about eight hours.

It is thought the boy grieved over a slight difference with his father. The boy wanted a new suit with long trousers, but the father had put him off.

BRAVE RESCUE BY A SOCIETY WOMAN

In Silk Dress Jumps in After Drowning Man and Brings Him to Shore

New York, Sept. 10.—Mrs. Towbridge Callaway, whose husband is the business partner of Stuyvesant Fish, and son of the late E. R. Callaway, former president of the New York Central Railroad, is being acclaimed a heroine at Spring Lake, N. J., where the Callaways have a summer home. Every one who has seen Mrs. Callaway in her silk dress and white slippers was displayed by her in the rescue of a man who was drowning 100 feet offshore.

While 35 men in bathing suits along the beach hesitated to venture to the man's aid, Mrs. Callaway stopped long enough to cast off a sweater, but otherwise dressed save that she left her slippers as she ran—plunged into the surf in her silk gown and went out after the imperiled bather.

He was Axel Benson, a butler in the summer home of Mrs. Bancroft Davis of Washington. Caught in a sea pass he had become exhausted in his efforts to fight his way out of it. He had too little breath to cry for help.

Mrs. Callaway was strolling along the board walk with her three small children when she saw the man's plight. She did not call upon any of the men in the beach to go out to help Benson but jumped down from the boardwalk and took to the water.

An expert swimmer from girlhood, she approached Benson with swift strokes. When she got about half way out to him he was so far gone that he went under. She came to the surface again but when she was close he sank again.

She dived for the drowning man and brought him to the surface with a firm hold on his hair. He was unconscious.

Knowing the strength of the current too well to exhaust herself in making a direct fight to reach shore Mrs. Callaway drifted on until she gradually worked her way out of the difficult situation. She and Benson were fully a quarter of a mile off shore before she turned and began to swim back with him.

By this time men on the beach had been aroused and swam to help Mrs. Callaway. But she was far from the end of her strength and ignored their proffers of assistance, bringing the unconscious man to shore unaided.

She followed the men to the Spring Lake Bathing and Tennis Club and directed the use of the pulmotor and in fifteen minutes had restored the butler to consciousness. An hour later Towbridge Callaway distinguished herself by performing a similar feat. He swam out and brought in a drowning man.

Hints for the Cook

Peach Marmalade.
Boil together 3 pounds of sugar and 3 cups of cold water 15 minutes. Add 24 peaches cut up small and boil 1 1/2 hours. Strain through a cloth. Put in a jar. Put in jelly glasses and seal when cold.

Peach Tart.
Line petty tins with puff paste, prick several times with a fork and bake in a moderate oven. Peel some large peaches, cut them in halves, remove the pits and place a blanched almond in each half. Boil the peaches for ten minutes in water and strain. Thicken each cup of juice with one teaspoon of arrowroot or cornstarch, add 1-2 cup of sugar and 1 teaspoon of lemon juice. Place half a peach in each shell of paste, pour in a little of the thickened juice and bake until the fruit is tender.

Peach Pudding
Mix two tablespoons flour thoroughly with one cup sugar. Pare good ripe peaches, cut into halves, leaving in a few stones. Put a layer in a deep earthen pudding dish and cover with half of the prepared sugar. Add a second layer of peaches. Cover with rest of the sugar. Dot with bits of butter. Pour in one cup of water. Cover with a rich biscuit dough. Make incisions in three or four places as the juices will not run out if the dish is deep enough. Bake in a quick oven. No sauce is needed, but cream may be used. Canned peaches may be used instead of the fresh fruit.

Ginger Apples.
Equal quantities of firm tart apples and brown sugar. Pare, core and cut into small pieces (about like dice) the apples. Make a syrup of the brown sugar, add carefully, add the grated peel and juice of two lemons and a few pieces of thinly sliced preserved dry ginger (or the ginger may be chopped not too finely). Add apples to the syrup and boil till the apples are clear and well cooked. Put into glass jars. Very delicious with meats.
